1.1 Software Components

During installation of your Messenger system, you selected components to install, as described in "Installing a Novell Messenger System" in the *Messenger 2.1 Installation Guide*.

1.1.1 Messaging Agent

One Messaging Agent runs in your Messenger system. The Messaging Agent performs the following activities:

- Accesses Novell eDirectory on behalf of users to authenticate users to the Messenger system when they start the Messenger client, to search for contacts as users build their contact lists, to save users' option settings for the Messenger client, and so on
- Transfers instant messages back and forth between Messenger users
- Maintains presence information about Messenger users so that the Messenger client can show user availability status (such as online, busy, away, and idle)
- Passes conversations to the Archive Agent if archiving is enabled

The Messaging Agent is highly scalable. If you are setting up a large Messenger system, you should run the Messaging Agent on a dedicated server with a processor speed of 1-2 GHz and with 1 GB of RAM. The Messaging Agent has been tested to easily support 1000 active conversations on such hardware. If you assume that 2% of Messenger users might be conversing simultaneously, you could plan on your Messenger system including as many as 50,000 users. Although Messenger has not been tested with this many actual users, you can be confident that it can scale to meet the needs of a very large number of users. 1.1.2 Archive Agent

If you need to retain a long-term record of all conversations, you can enable archiving. For example, you might need to retain conversations for legal reasons, as an aspect of a corporate e-mail retention policy.

In order to enable archiving, you need to run one Archive Agent in your Messenger system. The Archive Agent performs the following activities:

- Accesses eDirectory on behalf of authorized Messenger users in order to grant them access to the Messenger archive
- Receives completed conversations from the Messaging Agent and stores them in the Messenger archive
- Indexes the archived conversations so that they can be searched by authorized Messenger users
- · Performs searches in the Messenger archive for authorized Messenger users
- Manages expiration of old conversations
- Repairs the Messenger archive in case of damage to its database

1.1.3 Administration Files

Messenger system administration is performed by using ConsoleOne[®]. The Messenger snap-in to ConsoleOne can be installed with the version of ConsoleOne that runs on Windows workstations and servers, NetWare[®] servers, or Linux workstations and servers. After the initial installation of your Messenger system, you can install the Messenger snap-in to ConsoleOne to additional workstations and servers by using the Admin Files Only option of the Messenger Installation program.


1.2.1 Messenger Service


During creation of your Messenger system, you specified where you wanted to create your Messenger system in eDirectory, as described in "Installing a Novell Messenger System" in the *Messenger 2.1 Installation Guide*.

The MessengerService object created at that location represents your Messenger system in eDirectory.





The MessengerService container object provides container objects for a variety of types of Messenger objects. It might be convenient for you to store all Messenger objects under the MessengerService container, but this is not required. You can create Messenger objects elsewhere in the eDirectory tree, if necessary.

1.2.2 Servers and Agents

During creation of your Messenger system, you selected a location where the Messenger agents were installed, as described in "Installing a Novell Messenger System" in the *Messenger 2.1 Installation Guide*.

As a result, you have one Messenger Server object (named after the server where you installed the Messenger agents) that contains objects for the Messaging Agent and Archive Agent. These agent objects store the configuration information for the agents.

Figure 1-5 Server and Agent Objects



If you do not want to enable archiving, or if you want to run the Archive Agent on the same server with the Messaging Agent, one Messenger Server object is sufficient. If you want to enable archiving and run the Archive Agent on a different server, you should remove the initial Archive Agent object and then rerun the Messenger Installation program to create a second Messenger Server object that contains just an Archive Agent object. 1.2.3 Scope Profiles



If you want to subdivide your Messenger users into groups based on their e-mail addresses, you can create multiple scope profiles, as described in Section 3.3, "Providing User Searches Based on E-Mail Addresses," on page 108.

1.2.4 LDAP Profiles

During creation of your Messenger system, you chose between direct access and LDAP access to eDirectory, as described in "Installing a Novell Messenger System" in the *Messenger 2.1 Installation Guide*.


Figure 1-8 Directory Access Page in the Messenger Installation Program

This choice applies initially to how the Messenger agents access eDirectory to obtain their configuration settings from their eDirectory objects. This access method information is stored in the agent startup files. Without additional configuration, the eDirectory access method chosen during installation also applies to how the Messaging Agent accesses eDirectory on behalf of Messenger users when they log in to Messenger, search for contacts, establish conversations, and so on.

You might want the Messaging Agent to access eDirectory differently on behalf of Messenger users than how the agents access eDirectory to obtain their configuration information. If so, you will create an LDAP Profile object in the LDAP Container object.

Figure 1-9 LDAP Container Object and Contents




An LDAP profile is used instead of a scope profile to provide a list of LDAP servers that the Messenger agents can contact when they need eDirectory access. By creating an LDAP profile, you have more LDAP-specific options available when you configure eDirectory access, as described in "Providing LDAP Access to eDirectory for Messenger Users" on page 95.

1.2.5 Chat

The Messenger Chat container is used to store chat room objects. When a chat room is created, a chat room object is created in the Chat Container. The chat room objects contain the information about the chat room, including who owns the chat room, the name of the chat room, access, and other such information.

Figure 1-10 Chat Container and Contents




You can use the chat room objects to edit the chat rooms on the system. You can assign new owners, rename the chat rooms, change access and other such settings. For more information on chat room administration, see Chapter 5, "Managing Chat Rooms," on page 199.

1.2.6 Hosts

Messenger Host objects (referred to as host profiles) are used to divide Messenger users into groups based on the Internet domain portion of their Messenger addresses (which you configure to be equivalent to their e-mail addresses). No host profiles are created by default in your Messenger system.

Figure 1-11 Host Container and Contents



1.2.7 Policies

During creation of your Messenger system, a Default Policy object is created that establishes some basic Messenger user policies.

User policies for controlling specific functionality of the Messenger client, creating a default contact list, setting default privacy, establishing default contact list information, and creating default custom statuses can be established at any time, as described in Section 3.4, "Setting User Policies," on page 116.

1.2.8 User Properties

During creation of your Messenger system, all User objects that are located within the scope of your Messenger system have a Novell Messenger tab added to their object properties.

1.3 Language Availability

You can run the Messenger Installation program, administer your Messenger system in ConsoleOne, and run the Messenger agents in the following languages:

- English
- French
- German
- Spanish
- Portuguese

All available administration languages are automatically installed.

By default, the Messenger Installation program, ConsoleOne, and the Messenger agents start in the language of the operating system, if it is available. If the operating system language is not available for Messenger, the next default language is English. In the Installation program, you can select from among the available languages to override the English default. When starting the Messenger agents, you can use the /language startup switch to override the English default on Windows servers.

You can run the Messenger client in the following languages:

- Arabic
- Czech
- Chinese Simplified
- Chinese Traditional
- Danish
- Dutch
- English
- Finnish
- French
- German
- Hebrew

Users can select the languages they want when they install the Messenger client.

By default, the Messenger client starts in the language of the operating system, if it is available. If the operating system language is not available, the next default language is English. In the Messenger client, you can click *Tools* > *Options*, then select an interface language from those that have been installed. When starting the Messenger client, you can use the /l startup switch to override the English default and select an interface language from those that have been installed.

2.1 Starting the Messaging Agent

When you finish creating your Messenger system, the Installation program can start the Messenger agents for you. If you installed the Messenger agents on a Windows server, the Messaging Agent console appears on the Windows server console, as follows:

If you installed the Messenger agents on a NetWare[®] server, the Messaging Agent console appears on the NetWare server console.

If you installed the Messenger agents on a Linux server, the Messaging Agent, by default, runs as a daemon and has no comparable user interface. However, you can, if desired, start it in a terminal window so that status messages are displayed, as described in "Starting the Linux Messaging Agent in a Terminal Window" on page 31, and you can monitor the Messaging Agent from your Web browser, as described in "Using the Messaging Agent Web Console" on page 44.

2.1.1 Starting the NetWare Messaging Agent

The Installation program creates the nmstart.ncf file in the Messenger agent installation directory (sys:\novell\run by default). This file contains lines similar to the following example:

load sys:\novell\nm\ma\nmma.nlm @sys:\novell\nm\ma\strtup.ma
load sys:\novell\nm\aa\nmaa.nlm @sys:\novell\nm\aa\strtup.aa

If you do not plan to enable archiving, edit the nmstart.ncf file and comment out the second line so that the Archive Agent does not start when the nmstart.ncf file is run.

To start the Messaging Agent manually:

1 Enter sys:\novell\nm\nmstart.ncf at the NetWare server console prompt.

The Messaging Agent console appears.

To start the Messaging Agent automatically when the NetWare server restarts:

1 Add the following line to the autoexec.ncf file in the sys:\system directory:

sys:\novell\nm\nmstart.ncf

If you want to start the Messaging Agent in protected mode, you must be using LDAP access to Novell[®] eDirectory[™]. See "Using LDAP Access for the Messaging Agent" on page 35. In addition, when you stop the Messaging Agent agent in protected mode, you must manually unload the address space.

2.1.2 Starting the Linux Messaging Agent

You have several alternatives for starting the Messaging Agent on Linux:

Starting the Linux Messaging Agent as a Daemon

To start the Messaging Agent as a daemon, use the startup script provided in the /etc/init.d directory.

- 1 At the Linux server, become root by entering su and the root password.
- **2** Change to the /etc/init.d directory.
- **3** To start the Messaging Agent, enter the following command:

./novell-nmma start

You can also use the stop, restart, and status options for the Messaging Agent from the same directory.

Messaging Agent log files are created in the /var/opt/novell/log/messenger directory. The Messaging Agent can be monitored using the agent Web consoles from your Web browser, as described in "Using the Messaging Agent Web Console" on page 44.

Starting the Linux Messaging Agent in a Terminal Window

To start the Messaging Agent in a terminal window, run the Messaging Agent executable.

- 1 At the Linux server, become root by entering su and the root password.
- 2 Change to the /opt/novell/messenger/bin directory.

3 To start the Messaging Agent, enter the following command:

./nmma @/etc/opt/novell/messenger/strtup.ma

Agent status information and messages are displayed in the terminal window.

To stop the Messaging Agent when it is running in a terminal window, press Ctrl+C and the Messaging Agent performs a normal shutdown.

Configuring the Linux Messaging Agent to Start Automatically As a Startup Service

A startup service starts automatically each time the server reboots.

Configuring the Messaging Agent as a Startup Service on SUSE Linux

- 1 At the Linux server, become root by entering su and the root password.
- **2** If eDirectory for Linux is installed, enter the following command:

```
insserv novell-nmma
```

or

If eDirectory for Linux is not installed, use the following command to override the dependency on the ndsd service:

insserv -f novell-nmma

If you later want to remove the Messaging Agent as a startup service, enter the following command in a terminal window:

insserv -r novell-nmma

Configuring the Messaging Agent as a Startup Service on Red Hat Linux

- **1** At the Linux server, become root by entering su and the root password.
- **2** Enter the following command:

chkconfig --add novell-nmma

If you later want to remove the Messaging Agent as a startup service, enter the following command in a terminal window:

chkconfig --del novell-nmma

Starting the Messaging Agent As a Windows Application

To start the Messaging Agent manually:

Click Start > Programs > Novell Messenger Agents > Messaging Agent.
 You might want to create a desktop shortcut for this action.

To start the Messaging Agent automatically whenever the server restarts:

- 1 Click *Start* > *Settings* > *Taskbar* & *Start Menu* > *Advanced* > *Add*.
- **2** Browse to the directory where you installed the Messaging Agent (\novell\nm\ma).
- **3** Double-click nmma.exe, then add the startup file (strtup.ma) to the command line. Example: nmma.exe @strtup.ma
- 4 Click Next.
- **5** Select the *Startup* folder, provide a name for the shortcut, then click *Finish*.

Starting the Messaging Agent As a Windows Service

To start the Messaging Agent manually:

- 1 Click *Start* > *Settings* > *Control Panel*.
- **2** Double-click *Administrative Tools > Services*.
- **3** Right-click the Novell Messenger Messaging Agent service, then click Start.

To start the Messaging Agent automatically whenever the server restarts:

- 1 Click *Start* > *Settings* > *Control Panel*.
- **2** Double-click *Administrative Tools* > *Services*.
- 3 Right-click the Novell Messenger Messaging Agent service, then click Properties.
- **4** Set *Startup Type to Automatic*.
- **5** Click *OK* to save the Windows service startup setting.

If you do not want to run the Archive Agent along with the Messaging Agent, make sure that the Novell Messenger Archive Agent service is disabled.

To start the Messaging Agent without a user interface on the Windows server desktop:

- 1 Click *Start* > *Settings* > *Control Panel*.
- **2** Double-click *Administrative Tools* > *Services*.
- **3** Right-click the Novell Messenger Messaging Agent service, then click Properties.
- 4 Click Log On, then deselect Allow Service to Interact with Desktop.

If you suppress the Messaging Agent console in this manner, the Messaging Agent can still be monitored from the Messaging Agent Web console, as described in "Using the Messaging Agent Web Console" on page 44.

5 Click OK to save the Windows service logon setting.

2.1.4 Changing the eDirectory Access Method for Starting the Messaging Agent

The Messaging Agent cannot start if it cannot read its configuration settings from the Messaging Agent object in eDirectory. During installation, an eDirectory access method was selected, as described in "Installing a Novell Messenger System" in the *Messenger 2.1 Installation Guide*.

	/Idapport	Specifies the port number on which the LDAP server listens for service requests. Port 636 indicates an SSL connection; port 389 indicates a non-SSL connection.

Using LDAP Access for the Messaging Agent

1 Edit the Messaging Agent startup file (strtup.ma).

On Linux, the startup file is located in /etc/opt/novell/messenger.

On NetWare and Windows, the startup file is located in the Messenger Agent installation directory. You can edit the startup file from the Messaging Agent console. See "Controlling the Messaging Agent from the Messaging Agent Console" on page 44.

2 On Linux and Windows, comment out the /dirreplicaaddr switch.

On a NetWare server, this switch does not apply, because the eDirectory replica resides on the NetWare server.

- **3** Scroll down to the bottom of the startup file.
- **4** Remove the comment character (;) from the /ldap* switches and provide the required LDAP information, as listed in Table 2-1.
- **5** Save the startup file.
- **6** Stop and then start the Messaging Agent so that it reads its updated startup file and uses LDAP access to eDirectory.

If you have already created an LDAP profile to configure eDirectory access for Messenger users, as described in "Providing LDAP Access to eDirectory for Messenger Users" on page 95, the LDAP profile continues to be used for users, while the startup switches now control how the Messaging Agent accesses eDirectory to obtain its configuration information.

Using Direct Access for the Messaging Agent

1 Edit the Messaging Agent startup file (strtup.ma).

On Linux, the startup file is located in /etc/opt/novell/messenger.

On Windows and NetWare, the startup file is located in the Messenger Agent installation directory. You can edit the startup file from the Messaging Agent console. See "Controlling the Messaging Agent from the Messaging Agent Console" on page 44.

2 Remove the comment character (;) from the /dirreplicaaddr switch and provide the IP address of the eDirectory replica that you want the Messaging Agent to access.

On a NetWare server, this switch does not apply, because the eDirectory replica resides on the NetWare server.

- **3** Scroll down to the bottom of the startup file.
- 4 Comment out the /ldap* switches.


Removing the LDAP information causes the Messaging Agent to access the eDirectory replica directly.

- **5** If you want users to continue to use LDAP access, create an LDAP profile for them, as described in "Providing LDAP Access to eDirectory for Messenger Users" on page 95
- 6 Save the startup file.
- 7 Stop and then start the Messaging Agent so that it reads its updated startup file and uses direct access to eDirectory.

2.2 Configuring the Messaging Agent in ConsoleOne

The advantage to configuring the Messaging Agent in ConsoleOne[®], as opposed to using startup switches in the Messaging Agent startup file, is that the Messaging Agent configuration settings are stored in eDirectory.

- 1 In ConsoleOne, browse to and expand the Messenger Service object.
- 2 Select the Messenger Server object where the Messaging Agent runs.



3 Right-click the Messaging Agent object, then click *Properties*.

2.3 Establishing Messaging Security with SSL Encryption

Secure Sockets Layer (SSL) ensures secure communication between programs by encrypting the complete communication flow between the programs. The Installation program offered the opportunity to configure the Messaging Agent for SSL encryption, as described in "Installing a Novell Messenger System" in the *Messenger 2.1 Installation Guide*.

If you set up SSL encryption during installation, the Installation program copied the certificate file and key file you specified to the \novell\nm\certs directory to ensure availability for the Messenger agents.

2.3.1 Generating a Certificate Signing Request and Private Key

Before the Messaging Agent can use SSL encryption, you must send a Certificate Signing Request (CSR) to a Certification Authority (CA) and receive a public certificate file in return. The CSR includes the hostname of the server where the Messaging Agent runs. The Messaging Agent and the Archive Agent can use the same certificate if they run on the same server. The CSR also includes your choice of name and password for the private key file that must be used with each certificate. This information is needed when configuring the Messaging Agent to use SSL encryption.

One way to create a CSR is to use the GroupWise GWCSRGEN utility. See "Generating a Certificate Signing Request" in "Security Administration" in the GroupWise *GroupWise 8 Administration Guide* for instructions. This utility takes the information you provide and creates a .csr file to submit to a Certificate Authority. You might want to name the .csr file after the server it goes with, for example, *server_name.csr*.

2.3.2 Submitting the Certificate Signing Request to a Certificate Authority

To receive a server certificate, you need to submit the Certificate Signing Request (*server_name.csr* file) to a Certificate Authority. If you have not previously used a Certificate Authority, you can use the keywords "Certificate Authority" to search the Web for Certificate Authority companies. The Certificate Authority must be able to provide the certificate in Base64/ PEM or PFX format.

IMPORTANT: You cannot use an eDirectory root certificate (rootcert.der file) as a public certificate.

The process of submitting the CSR varies from company to company. Most provide online submission of the request. Follow their instructions for submitting the request.

The Novell Certificate Server[™], which runs on a NetWare server with Novell eDirectory, enables you to establish your own Certificate Authority and issue server certificates for yourself. For more information, see the Novell Certificate Server site (http://www.novell.com/products/certserver).

2.3.3 Installing the Certificate on the Server

After processing your CSR, the Certificate Authority returns to you a certificate (*server_name.crt*) file and a private key (*server_name.key*) file. Copy the files to the certs subdirectory of the Messenger agent installation directory.

2.3.4 Configuring the Messaging Agent for SSL

After you have a public certificate and a private key file available on the server where the Messaging Agent runs, you are ready to configure the Messaging Agent to use SSL encryption.

- 1 In ConsoleOne, browse to and expand the Messenger Service object.
- 2 Right-click the Messenger Server object, then click *Properties*.

Certificate Path: This field defaults to \novell\nm\certs for NetWare and Windows, and / opt/novell/messenger/certs for Linux.

IMPORTANT: The certificate path must be located on the same server where the Messenger agents are installed. If your SSL certificate and key file are located on a different server, you must copy them into the directory specified in the *Certificate Path* field so that they are always accessible to the Messenger agents.

SSL Certificate: Browse to and select the public certificate file. Or, if it is located in the directory specified in the *Certificate Path* field, you can simply type the filename.

SSL Key File: Browse to and select your private key file. Or, if it is located in the directory specified in the *Certificate Path* field, you can simply type the filename.

Set Password: Provide the key file password you established when you submitted the certificate signing request.

Enable SSL: Select this option to enable SSL encryption for your Messenger system.

Because you provided the SSL information on the Messenger Server object, it applies to both the Messaging Agent and the Archive Agent if both agents are running on the same server. The same information can be provided on the Security page of each Messenger agent if necessary.

- **5** Click *OK* to save the SSL settings.
- 6 Stop and then start the Messaging Agent to start using SSL encryption.

Corresponding Startup Switches: You can also use the /certpath, /certfile, /keyfile, /keypassword, and /ssl startup switches in the Messaging Agent startup file to configure the Messaging Agent to use SSL encryption.

2.4 Changing the Agent User Password

When the Messaging Agent and Archive Agent are installed, the user's eDirectory password that is used to read the configuration that starts the agents is stored in the startup file for each agent. Prior to Messenger 2.0.2 Hot Patch 1, this password was stored in plain text. By default in Messenger 2.0.2 Hot Patch 1, the password is obfuscated to prevent it from being read.

If you want to check whether the password has been obfuscated, look in the startup files. The password is prepended with \$\$: if it has been obfuscated.

The GWMPassword utility is used to change the password in the startup file for both the Messaging Agent and the Archive Agent.

Before using the utility, you must verify the following prerequisite:

To change the password:

- 1 In Windows, click Start > Run, then enter cmd to open a command window.
- **2** Use the following command to change the password:

```
c:\gwm202\server\utility\gwmpwd\gwmpwd.exe --startup=<path to startup
file> --password=<new password>
```

Replace c:\gwm202 with the location where the hot patch files were extracted.

2.4.2 Changing the Agent User Password on Linux

Before using the utility, you must verify the following prerequisites:

- Make suer you have installed Messenger 2.0.2 Hot Patch 1.
- A drive must be mapped to the location of the startup file.
- 1 After installing Messenger 2.0.2 Hot Patch 1, change to the /opt/novell/messenger/bin/ directory.
- **2** Become root by entering sux and the root password.
- **3** Use the following command to change the password:

```
./gwmpwd --startup=<path to startup file> --password=<new password>
```

Statistics Box	Displays the number of requests that the Messaging Agent has received from Messenger clients or from the Archive Agent, along with the number of requests that it has been unable to respond to. Pending requests might indicate a need to optimize Messaging Agent performance to better serve Messenger users.
Log Message Box	Displays the same information that is being written to the Messaging Agent log file. The amount of information displayed depends on the current log settings for the Messaging Agent. See "Using Messaging Agent Log Files" on page 57. The information scrolls up automatically.

2.5.3 Using Messaging Agent Log Files

Error messages and other information about Messaging Agent functioning are written to log files as well as displaying on the Messaging Agent console. Log files can provide a wealth of information for resolving problems with Messaging Agent functioning.

- 1 In ConsoleOne, browse to and expand the MessengerService object.
- 2 Select the Messenger Server object.
- **3** Right-click the Messaging Agent, then click *Properties*.
- **4** Click *Agent* > *Log Settings*.

5 Fill in the following fields:

Log Level: Controls the amount of information logged by the Messaging Agent. Logged information is displayed in the log message box and written to the Messaging Agent log file during the current agent session. The default is Normal, which displays only the essential information suitable for a smoothly running Messaging Agent. Use Verbose to display the essential information, plus additional information helpful for troubleshooting. Use Diagnostic where very detailed, code-specific information is required.

Enable disk logging: Select this option so that the information displayed in the message log box at the Messaging Agent console is also saved to disk in log files.

Log Files Path: Specify the directory where the Messaging Agent stores its log files. On NetWare and Windows, the default location is the logs subdirectory of the Messaging Agent installation directory. On Linux, the default location is /var/opt/novell/log/messenger/ma.

Typically you find multiple log files in the specified directory. The first four characters represent the date. The next three identify the agent. A three-digit extension allows for multiple log files created on the same day. For example, a log file named 0518nma.001 indicates that it is a Messaging Agent log file, created on May 18. If you restarted the Messaging Agent on the same day, a new log file started, named 0518nma.002.

Log Maximum Age: Specify how many days to keep Messaging Agent log files on disk. The default is 14 days.

Log Maximum Size: Specify the maximum amount of disk space for all Messaging Agent log files. When the specified disk space is consumed, the Messaging Agent deletes existing log files, starting with the oldest. The default is 128 MB.

- 6 Click OK to save the log file settings.
- 7 Stop and then start the Messaging Agent to put the new log settings into effect.

Corresponding Startup Switches: You can also use the /log, /loglevel, /logdays, and /logmax startup switches in the Messaging Agent startup file to configure Messaging Agent log files.

2.5.4 Using GroupWise Monitor

GroupWise Monitor can be configured to monitor the Messaging Agent as well as the GroupWise Agents (Post Office Agent, Message Transfer Agent, Internet Agent, and WebAccess Agent). For background information about GroupWise Monitor, see "Monitor" in the GroupWise 8 *Administration Guide*.

The Messaging Agent appears in the root agent group, along with the Archive Agent if it is running on the same server. You might want to create an agent group specifically for the Messenger agents. See "Creating and Managing Agent Groups" in "Monitor" in the GroupWise *GroupWise 8 Administration Guide*.

2.5.5 Using Novell 6.5 Remote Manager

If the Messaging Agent is running on a NetWare 6.5 server, you can use the IP Address Management feature in Novell Remote Manager (*NetWare Remote Manager > Manage Server > IP Address Management*) to view the IP address and port configuration for the Messaging Agent. This is also true for the Archive Agent running on a NetWare 6.5 server.

You access Novell Remote Manager by entering the following URL in a Web browser:

http://server address:8008

2.5.6 Using SNMP Monitoring Programs

You can monitor the Messaging Agent from the Management and Monitoring component of Novell ZENworks[®] for Servers, ManageWise[®], or any other SNMP management and monitoring program. When properly configured, the Messaging Agent sends SNMP traps to network management consoles for display along with other SNMP monitored programs. It also responds to requests for configuration and status information from SNMP management and monitoring programs.

Although the Messaging Agent is SNMP-enabled by default, the server where the Messaging Agent is installed must be properly configured to support SNMP, and the Messaging Agent object in eDirectory must be properly configured as well. To set up SNMP services for your Messenger server, complete the following tasks:

Setting Up SNMP Services on a NetWare Server

The Messaging Agent supports SNMP through the SNMP services loaded on the NetWare server. SNMP services are provided through the SNMP NLM[™]. The SNMP NLM initiates and responds to requests for monitoring information and generates trap messages.

If the SNMP NLM is not loaded before the Messaging Agent, Messaging Agent still loads and functions normally, but SNMP support is disabled. The Messaging Agent does not attempt to auto-load snmp.nlm.

1 Go to the console of the NetWare server where you want to implement SNMP services.

The server should already have the Messenger agents installed.

2 Enter the command to load the SNMP NLM:

Syntax: load snmp v control=x monitor=y trap=z

where v represents Verbose, meaning to display informational messages, and *x*, *y* and *z* are replaced with your system SNMP community strings for SNMP SETs, GETs and TRAPs.

Example: load snmp v control=private monitor=public trap=all

The TCP/IP NLM automatically loads snmp.nlm, using default values for the community strings. If your system uses different community string values, load snmp.nlm before tcpip.nlm.

If the SNMP NLM is already loaded, you can add the control and trap parameters by entering the following at the console prompt:

snmp control= trap=

3 To automatically load these commands, include them in the autoexec.ncf file.

For more information about implementing SNMP services, see your NetWare documentation.

Setting Up SNMP Services on a Linux Server

The Linux Messaging Agent is compatible with NET-SNMP. An older version of SNMP called UCD-SNMP cannot be used with the Linux Messaging Agent. NET-SNMP comes standard with the versions of Red Hat* Linux supported for Messenger 1.0 for Linux, but it does not come standard with the supported versions of SUSE[®] Linux. If you are using SUSE Linux, you must update to NET-SNMP in order to use SNMP to monitor the Linux Messaging Agent.

- **1** Make sure you are logged in as root.
- **2** If NET-SNMP is not already set up on your Linux server, use the following command to configure SNMP:

snmpconf -g basic_setup

The snmpconf command creates the snmpd.conf file in one of the following directories, depending on your version of Linux:

/usr/share/snmp/usr/local/share/snmp~/.snmp

- **3** Locate the snmpd.conf file on your Linux server.
- 4 In a text editor, modify the snmpd.conf file:
 - **4a** Add the following line:

dlmod Gwmweb /opt/novell/messenger/lib/libnmsnmp.so.1

- 4b Save and exit the snmpd.conf file.
- 5 Restart the SNMP daemon (snmpd) to put the changes into effect.
- 6 In a text editor, modify the nmsnmp.conf file in the /etc/opt/novell/messenger directory:
 - **6a** Set /daemonPort to a unique port number for the Messaging Agent to listen on; for example, 8305.
 - **6b** If you have not already configured the Messaging Agent Web console, as described in "Setting Up the Messaging Agent Web Console" on page 44, assign an HTTP port for the Messaging Agent.

You can set the HTTP port in ConsoleOne, using the same steps as for setting up the Web console, or you can set /maPort to a unique port number, such as 8301. If you want to use SNMP with the Archive Agent, you can also provide an HTTP port for it by using /aaPort if you update the nmsnmp.conf file, rather than providing the settings in ConsoleOne.

- 6c Save and exit the nmsnmp.conf file.
- 7 In ConsoleOne, enable SNMP:
 - 7a Browse to and right-click the Messenger Server object, then click *Properties*.
 - **7b** Click *Server* > *General*.
 - 7c Select Enable SNMP.
 - 7d Click *OK* to save the setting.
- **8** Restart the Messaging Agent.
- **9** Skip to "Copying and Compiling the Messaging Agent MIB File" on page 63.

Setting Up SNMP Services on a Windows Server

The SNMP service is usually not included during the initial Windows operating system installation. The SNMP service can be easily added at any time. To add or configure the SNMP service, you must be logged in as a member of the Administrator group.

To add the SNMP service to a Windows 2000 server:

- 1 From the Control Panel, double-click Add/Remove Programs.
- 2 Click Add/Remove Windows Components.
- **3** Select *Management and Monitoring Tools*.
- 4 Click Details, then select Simple Network Management Protocol.

For more information about configuring the SNMP service, see your Windows 2000 documentation.

The Messenger Installation program includes an option for installing SNMP support. However, if the Windows server where you installed the Messaging Agent did not yet have SNMP set up, that installation option was not available. Now that you have set up SNMP, you can install Messaging Agent SNMP support.

Rerun the Messenger Installation program, using the Install Server option as described in the *Messenger 2.1 Installation Guide*, noticing that the Install and Configure SNMP for the Messenger Agents option is now available and selected.

Copying and Compiling the Messaging Agent MIB File

An SNMP-enabled Messaging Agent returns information contained in a Management Information Base (MIB). The MIB is an ASCII data structure that defines the information gathered. It also defines the properties that can be monitored and managed on the SNMP-enabled Messaging Agent.

Before you can monitor an SNMP-enabled Messaging Agent, you must compile the nmma.mib file by using your SNMP management program. On NetWare and Windows, the Messenger agent MIBs are located in the downloaded *GroupWise Messenger 2.1* image in the \server\snmp directory. On Linux, the Messenger MIBs are located in the /etc/opt/novell/messenger/mibs directory after installation.

1 Copy the nmma.mib file to the location required by your SNMP management program.

For example, ManageWise users would copy the nmma.mib file to the \mw\nms\snmpmibs\current directory. ZENworks for Servers users can access the nmma.mib file in the downloaded *GroupWise Messenger 2.1* image.

2 Compile or import the nmma.mib file as required by your SNMP management program.

For example, to compile the nmma.mib file for ZENworks for Servers:

2a In ConsoleOne, right-click the Site Server object, then click *Properties* > *MIB Pool*.

- **2b** Click *Modify Pool* > *Add*.
- **2c** Browse to and select the nmma.mib file, then click OK.
- 2d Click Compile.
- **2e** Make sure that the server where the Messaging Agent is running is configured to send SNMP traps to the ZfS Site Server.
 - On a NetWare server, add the IP address or hostname of the ZfS Site Server to the traptarg.cfg file in the sys:\etc directory.
 - On a Windows server, add the IP address or hostname of the ZfS Site Server to the list of trap destinations. From the Windows 2000 Control Panel, double-click *Administrative Tools*, then click *Services > SNMP Service > Properties > Traps*.

Refer to your SNMP management program documentation for specific instructions.

3 If you are using ManageWise, continue with "Customizing Your ManageWise Installation to Monitor the Messaging Agent" on page 64.

or

If you are not using ManageWise, skip to"Configuring the Messaging Agent for SNMP Monitoring" on page 64.

Customizing Your ManageWise Installation to Monitor the Messaging Agent

The downloaded *GroupWise Messenger 2.1* image includes a file that helps ManageWise monitor the Messenger agents more effectively. These capabilities are available only with ManageWise, not with ZENworks for Servers.

The nmma.mib file includes the standard SNMP management information. In addition, the file includes annotations that enhance the Alert functions of ManageWise.

For example, the Summary provides more detailed information than the Description does in other SNMP management programs. The ManageWise annotations are embedded in comments; therefore, they have no affect on other SNMP management programs

When Messaging Agent alarms appear in ManageWise, you can double-click the alarm to display the alarm information contained in the Messenger Alarm help file. To enable this feature, copy the nmalarm.hlp file from the \server\snmp directory in the downloaded *GroupWise Messenger 2.1* image to the \mw\nms\help directory on your ManageWise station. This help file explains the alarms the Messaging Agent might produce by giving a description, cause, and action for each alarm.

Configuring the Messaging Agent for SNMP Monitoring

In order for SNMP monitoring programs to monitor the Messaging Agent, the Messaging Agent must be configured with an SNMP community string.

- **1** In ConsoleOne, browse to and expand the MessengerService object.
- **2** Right-click the Messenger Server object, then click *Properties*.
- **3** Click *Server* > *General*.

- **4** Make sure that *Enable SNMP* is selected.
- 5 In the SNMP Community field, provide your system SNMP community GET string.
- 6 Click *OK* to save the SNMP settings.
- 7 Stop and then start the Messaging Agent to put the SNMP settings into effect.

2.6 Optimizing Messaging Agent Performance

You can adjust how the Messaging Agent functions to optimize its performance. Before attempting optimization, you should run the Messaging Agent long enough to observe its efficiency and its impact on other network applications running on the same server. See Section 2.5, "Monitoring the Messaging Agent," on page 42.

Also, remember that optimizing your network hardware and operating system can make a difference in Messaging Agent performance.

- 1 In ConsoleOne, browse to and expand the MessengerService object.
- **2** Select the Messenger Server object.
- 3 Right-click the Messaging Agent object, then click Properties.
- **4** Click *Agent* > *Performance*.

5 Fill in the following fields to configure how the Messaging Agent communicates with Messenger users:

Maximum number of users: Specify the maximum number of Messenger users that you want the Messaging Agent to be able to service at once. The default is 5120, which should be adequate for a very large Messenger system.

Client/Server threads: Specify the number of client/server threads that you want the Messaging Agent to start. The Messaging Agent uses its client/server threads to service Messenger clients, to download Messenger client software to users, and to communicate with the Archive Agent if archiving is enabled. Up to half of the client/server threads can be used for downloading the Messenger client software if demand requires it.

The default number of client/server threads is 15. For a large Messenger system, you could increase the number to 50 or more, depending on the system resources of the server where the Messaging Agent is running.

6 Fill in the following fields to configure how the Messaging Agent communicates with eDirectory when using direct access:

Default number of connections: Specify the minimum number of direct access connections you want open between the Messaging Agent and eDirectory. The direct access connections between the Messaging Agent and eDirectory are used to authenticate Messenger users when they start the Messenger client, to perform searches for Messenger users when users build their contact lists, to save user option settings for the Messenger client, and for other directory-based operations. By default, the number of connections is 10.

Do not set the default number of connections to be greater than the number of client/server threads. This results in open connections that could never be serviced by the Messaging Agent.

Idle direct access connections occupy memory, but using an existing connection is faster than creating a new connection. The default number of connections is always kept open, even if some are idle.

Idle timeout: If more than the default number of direct access connections are open between the Messaging Agent and eDirectory, and if any connection is idle for the specified amount of time, the idle connection is closed. By default, this time is 30 seconds.

Maximum number of connections: Specify the maximum number of eDirectory connections that the Messaging Agent can create. The default is 50 connections.

Do not set the maximum number of connections to be greater than the number of client/server threads. This results in open connections that could never be serviced by the Messaging Agent.

Maximum query results: Specify the maximum number of contacts you want the Messaging Agent to return when Messenger users search for other Messenger users when adding contacts to their contact lists.

- 7 Click OK to save the Messaging Agent performance settings.
- 8 Stop and then start the Messaging Agent to put the new performance settings into effect.

Corresponding Startup Switches: You can also use the /maxconns, /threads, / dirdefaultconnections, /diridletimeout, /dirmaxconnections, and /dirquerymaxresults startup switches in the Messaging Agent startup file to configure Messaging Agent performance.

2.7 Managing the Messaging Server

As your Messenger system grows and evolves, you might need to reconfigure the server where the Messaging Agent runs or move Messaging Agent directories to different locations.

2.7.1 Binding the Messaging Agent to a Specific IP Address

On a server with multiple IP addresses, the Messaging Agent binds to all available IP addresses, and Messenger clients can communicate with the Messaging Agent on all available IP addresses unless you bind them to a specific address.

- **1** Stop the Messaging Agent on the server.
- **2** In ConsoleOne, browse to and expand the MessengerService object.
- 3 Right-click the Messaging Agent object, then click Properties.
- 4 Click Agent > Identification

- 6 In the *Work Path* field, change the path to the working directory to the current location.
- 7 Click OK to save the new working directory location.
- 8 Start the Messaging Agent.
- 9 Delete the previous working directory to conserve disk space.

By default, the Messaging Agent and the Archive Agent use the same working directory if they are running on the same server, as specified on the *General* tab of the Messenger Server object. If you want the Messaging Agent to use a separate working directory, you can specify the working directory on each agent object (*Agent* tab > *General* page > *Work Path* field). The location specified for the Messaging Agent object overrides the location specified for the Messenger Server object.

2.8 Using Messaging Agent Startup Switches

You can override settings provided in ConsoleOne by using startup switches in the Messaging Agent startup file (strtup.ma). On NetWare and Windows, the startup file is located in the Messenger Agent installation directory. On Linux, the startup file is located in /etc/opt/novell/ messenger. You can override startup switches provided in the startup file by using startup switches on the command line. A default scope profile was established during installation, as described in "Installing a Novell Messenger System" in the *Messenger 2.1 Installation Guide*.



There is no limit to the number of eDirectory contexts you can list in a scope profile. However, all contexts in a scope profile must be in the same eDirectory tree where your Messenger system is located.

3.2.1 Providing LDAP Access to eDirectory for Messenger Users

To customize LDAP access for Messenger users, you create an LDAP profile where you provide information about the LDAP servers that are available in your system. You need only one LDAP profile for your Messenger system, no matter how many LDAP servers you have.


If you have already configured your default scope profile, as explained in "Editing the Default Scope Profile to Include Additional eDirectory Users" on page 92, you can continue to use the default scope information, while providing additional LDAP configuration information in the LDAP profile. However, the LDAP profile allows you to provide scope information in a more detailed, LDAP-specific manner. As you set up the LDAP profile, you can decide which source of scope information you want to use for your Messenger system.

1 On the *General* tab, fill in the following fields if you want to use the LDAP profile, rather than a scope profile, to define the scope of your Messenger system:

Base DN: Browse to and select the container object in eDirectory where the majority of User objects are located. Your selection is displayed in the *Base DN* field as the distinguished name (DN) of the container object. For example, OU=users,O=corporate.

Base scope: Select the scope you want searched for User objects:

- Search whole subtreee
- Search base DN and one level below
- Only search base DN

Searching only the base DN provides the fastest results. Searching the whole subtree provides the most thorough search. The base scope you select depends on where User objects are located in your eDirectory tree.

Additional DNs: If your eDirectory tree includes User objects that are located outside of the base DN, list other DNs as needed. The additional DNs are searched in the order listed.

Follow LDAP referrals: Select this option if you want to take advantage of the LDAP referral feature. The eDirectory replica that an LDAP server accesses might or might not contain all the contexts that exist in the eDirectory tree. If the LDAP server does not find any results in the contexts available in its eDirectory replica, it can refer the query to another LDAP server that accesses a different eDirectory replica, where additional contexts might be available for searching and where results might be obtained.

Selecting this option might add to the search time but might produce better results. Do not select this feature if you do not want the Messaging agent to be referred to possibly unknown LDAP servers.

IMPORTANT: If you previously associated a scope profile with your Messenger system, you must remove it in order for the scope information provided in the above fields to take effect. Right-click the Messenger Service object, then click *Properties*. On the *General* tab, clear the contents of the *Scope Profile* field, then click *OK* to save the change. Also check for and remove any scope profiles associated with policies or individual users that you want to use the LDAP profile.

2 On the *General* tab, fill in the following fields to control how you want information returned when users search for other Messenger users to add to their contact lists in the Messenger client:

Query Maximum Results: Specify the maximum number of users you want returned to the Messenger client when users search for other users to add to their contact lists. The default is 100.

Query Timeout: Specify in seconds the maximum amount of time you want a search for Messenger users to take. If no users are found within the allotted time, the Messenger user receives no results from the search. The default is 30 seconds.

3 On the *General* tab, fill in the following fields to provide LDAP server login information if you want the Messaging Agent to log in differently on behalf of Messenger users than it does when logging in to obtain its configuration information:

Username: Specify the LDAP username that the Messaging Agent can use to access the LDAP server (for example, CN=Admin,OU=Users,O=Corporate). The Messaging Agent needs to log in with Read, Write, and Browse rights to all User objects. This user must be added as a trustee to the eDirectory Tree object (or to the top organizational container that holds your Messenger system and users). Steps for this are provided later in this procedure.

Set Password: Click *Set Password*, type the password for the LDAP username twice for verification, then click *Set Password*.

- 4 Click *Apply* to save the general LDAP settings.
- **5** Click *LDAP Profile > Connections* to display the Connections page.

6 Fill in the following fields to configure how the Messaging Agent connects to LDAP servers:

Default Connections: Specify the minimum number of connections that the Messaging Agent can establish with each LDAP server on startup and maintain even when the connections are idle. The default is 10.

Do not set the default number of connections greater than the number of client/server threads defined for the Messaging Agent on the Performance page of the Messaging Agent object. This results in open connections that could never be serviced by the Messaging Agent.

Idle connections occupy memory, but using an existing connection is faster than creating a new connection. The default number of connections is always kept open, even if they are idle.

Idle Timeout: Specify in seconds how long a connection between the Messaging Agent and an LDAP server should remain open if it is idle and there are more than the minimum number of connections open. The default is 30 seconds. Increase the idle timeout to maintain more open connections. Decrease the idle timeout to conserve memory.

Maximum Connections: Specify the maximum number of connections that can exist between the Messaging Agent and each LDAP server. The default is 30.

Below the *Connection Settings* fields, the *Connections List* defines which LDAP servers you want the Messaging Agent to be able to connect to.

Connections List: The LDAP servers that you add to the connections list form a pool of LDAP servers. When the Messenger client tries to connect to the Messenger system, if the first LDAP server it contacts isn't responding, the Messenger client automatically tries another LDAP server in the pool until it is able to connect.

IP Address or DNS Hostname: Specify the IP address or DNS hostname of the LDAP server.

Port: Specify the port number on which the LDAP server listens for service requests. The typical port number for non-SSL connections is 389. The typical port number for SSL connections is 636.

Preference: Assign the LDAP server a preference (or priority) of 0, 1, or 2. The Messaging Agent attempts to contact all priority 0 LDAP servers before contacting priority 1 LDAP servers and all priority 1 LDAP servers before any priority 2 LDAP servers.

IMPORTANT: For best performance, do not define more than one priority 0 LDAP server.

SSL Enabled: Select SSL Enabled if the LDAP server uses SSL encryption.

Root Certificate: Specify the full path to the root certificate on the LDAP server. Typically, the root certificate is named rootcert.der. On a NetWare[®] server, it is located in sys:\public. On a Windows server, it is exported to a user-specified location after installation of eDirectory for Windows.

If you do not specify a root certificate, your LDAP server must be configured to accept clear text passwords in order for you to enable SSL encryption without a root certificate.

- **9** Click *OK* to save the information for the LDAP server.
- **10** Repeat Step 7 through Step 9 for each LDAP server that you want to use to provide eDirectory access.

When you specify multiple LDAP servers, they form a pool of available LDAP servers that the Messaging Agent contacts in a round-robin fashion. This provides very reliable eDirectory access for Messenger users.

- **11** Click *OK* to save the LDAP profile.

Corresponding Startup Switches: You can also use the /dirquerymaxresults, /


Assigning Required Rights for eDirectory Access

If the user you specified in Step 3 in "Configuring the LDAP Profile" on page 96 does not have adequate rights, the Messaging Agent cannot access eDirectory successfully. Without sufficient rights to the Messenger Service object, the Messaging Agent cannot access its configuration information on the Messaging Agent object in eDirectory. Without sufficient rights to User objects, the Messaging Agent cannot access users' contact lists, Messenger client settings, and other user-specific information.

3.2.2 Providing Full Name Indexing

When users search for a contact, the Messenger client uses the eDirectory indexes of User object attributes in order to find users. By default, the eDirectory Full Name attribute is not indexed. As a result, when users perform a name search, results are returned more slowly because all User objects in the scope must be checked. Therefore, you should configure eDirectory on the Messenger server so that it indexes the Full Name attribute.

This procedure requires the eDirectory snap-in to ConsoleOne, which can be obtained from the Novell Product Downloads site (http://download.novell.com).

1 In ConsoleOne, browse to and right-click the Server object that represents your NetWare, Linux, or Windows server, then click *Properties*.

This matches the entire value or the just first part of the value of an attribute. For example, value matching could be used to find entries with a Full Name that is equal to "Jensen" as well as entries that begin with "Jen."

- **5** Click *OK* to add the Full Name attribute to the list.
- 6 Click OK again to activate the index for the Full Name attribute.

3.2.3 Selecting Bind or Compare eDirectory Access for Users

When the Messenger agents authenticate to eDirectory on behalf of Messenger users (using either direct access or LDAP access), they use either a bind or compare operation. By default, a compare operation is used.

With a compare, the Messaging Agent provides the user's password to eDirectory or the LDAP server. When responding to a compare request, eDirectory or the LDAP server compares the password provided by the Messaging Agent with the user's password in eDirectory, and returns the results of the comparison.

You can configure the Messaging Agent to use a bind operation instead of a compare. With a bind, the Messaging Agent essentially logs in to eDirectory or the LDAP server. When responding to a bind request, eDirectory and most LDAP servers enforce password policies such as grace logins and intruder lockout, if such policies have been implemented.

Using a compare can provide faster access than a bind; there is typically less overhead involved because password policies are not being enforced.

If you want Messenger users to authenticate by using a bind rather than a compare:

1 Edit the Messaging Agent startup file (strtup.ma).

On NetWare and Windows, the startup file is located in the Messenger Agent installation directory. You can edit the startup file from the Messaging Agent console. See "Controlling the Messaging Agent from the Messaging Agent Console" on page 44.

On Linux, the startup file is located in /etc/opt/novell/messenger.

- **2** Remove the comment character (;) from the /diruserauthbind switch.
- **3** Save the startup file.
- **4** Stop and then start the Messaging Agent so that it reads its updated startup file and uses a bind operation when authenticating to eDirectory on behalf of Messenger users.

3.2.4 Forcing Direct eDirectory Access for Users

You can configure the Messaging Agent to use direct access to eDirectory on behalf of Messenger users even if you have configured the Messaging Agent to use LDAP access when retrieving its configuration information, as described in "Using LDAP Access for the Messaging Agent" on page 35.

If you want Messenger users to use direct access to eDirectory:

1 Edit the Messaging Agent startup file (strtup.ma).

On NetWare and Windows, the startup file is located in the Messenger Agent installation directory. You can edit the startup file from the Messaging Agent console. See "Controlling the Messaging Agent from the Messaging Agent Console" on page 44.

On Linux, the startup file is located in /etc/opt/novell/messenger.

- **2** Remove the comment character (;) from the /diruserforcedirect switch.
- **3** Save the startup file.
- **4** Stop and then start the Messaging Agent so that it reads its updated startup file and uses direct access when authenticating to eDirectory on behalf of Messenger users.

3.2.5 Customizing Authentication and Searches by eDirectory Attribute

By default, when Messenger users search by user ID, the Messaging Agent searches on the CN (common name) eDirectory attribute. The CN attribute corresponds to the name of User objects in the eDirectory tree. Typically, User objects are named based on users' names, such as SJones or SophieJones. If your eDirectory tree uses the CN attribute for something less helpful in the Messenger client (for example, employee numbers), you can use the /diruseralias startup switch in the Messaging Agent startup file to configure the Messaging Agent to search on a different attribute besides CN. For example, you might want the Messaging Agent to search based on the Internet EMail Address. You can use any eDirectory attribute of type STRING.

To change the eDirectory attribute that the Messaging Agent searches on:

1 Edit the Messaging Agent startup file (strtup.ma)

On NetWare and Windows, the startup file is located in the Messenger Agent installation directory. You can edit the startup file from the Messaging Agent console. See "Controlling the Messaging Agent from the Messaging Agent Console" on page 44.

On Linux, the startup file is located in /etc/opt/novell/messenger.

- 2 Remove the comment character (;) from the /diruseralias switch.
- **3** Provide the eDirectory attribute in quotation marks:

Example: /diruseralias-"Internet EMail Address"

- 4 Save the startup file.
- **5** Stop and then start the Messaging Agent so that it reads its updated startup file and searches on the specified eDirectory attribute instead of CN.

When you restart the Messaging Agent, Messenger users need to log in again in order to see the results of this change.

3.3 Providing User Searches Based on E-Mail Addresses

By default, Messenger users can search for other users to add to their contact lists in the Messenger client by first name, by last name, by first and last name, and by eDirectory user ID. You can add the capability of searching on e-mail addresses by setting up Messenger addresses that are equivalent to users' existing e-mail addresses. To set up Messenger addresses, you must add one or more hostnames to your Messenger system.



3.3.1 Establishing a Hostname for Your Messenger System

If all of your Messenger users have e-mail addresses that are part of the same Internet domain (for example, Corporate.com), you can set up your Messenger system to recognize that Internet domain name as a Messenger address. This enables users to locate contacts by searching for their e-mail addresses (for example, JSmith@Corporate.com).

- **1** In ConsoleOne, browse to and expand the Messenger Service object.
- 2 Right-click the Host Container object, then click New > Object.


If archiving is enabled, authorized Messenger users can search the Messenger archive for users' conversations by specifying their e-mail addresses. Conversations archived before the hostname was established are not searchable by e-mail address.

3.3.2 Setting Up Multiple Hostnames

If your organization is large, it might be divided up into units. For example, Corporate.com might include Development.Corporate.com, Sales.Corporate.com, and so forth. By setting up multiple hostnames, you enable Messenger users to search for contacts within subsets of your organization.

In order to set up multiple hostnames, you must first set up a scope profile for each hostname.

- 2 Right-click the Scope Container object, then click *New* > *Object*.



3.4.5 Controlling Users' Contact Lists

Maximum Number of Contacts: Specify the maximum number of users that users governed by this policy can add to their contact lists. The default is 100. Users' contact lists are stored on their User objects in your Messenger system. Therefore, you might want to limit the amount of space occupied by contact lists in eDirectory.

Maximum Number of Folders: Specify the maximum number of folders that users governed by this policy can create in their contact lists. The default is 50.

- **4** If you want to create a default contact list for the users governed by this policy:
 - **4a** To add users to the default contact list, click *Add User*, browse to and select one or more User objects, then click *OK*.

- **4b** To add a folder in the default contact list, click *Add Folder*, select the new folder, click *Edit*, specify the name of the folder, then click *OK*.
- **4c** To add users to a folder, select the folder, click *Add User*, browse to and select one or more User objects, then click *OK*.

You cannot drag and drop users into a folder.

- **4d** To expand or collapse the list of users in a folder, double-click the folder.
- **4e** To change the way a username displays in the default contact list, select the user, click *Edit*, specify the username that you want to appear in the contact list, then click *OK*.

This does not rename the eDirectory User object.

4f To delete a user or folder from the default contact list, select the user or folder, then click *Remove.*

Folders do not need to be empty to be deleted. You are not prompted for confirmation. There is no undo.

4g If you are creating an extensive default contact list, click *Apply* occasionally to save your work.

New Messenger users see the default contact list when they first start the Messenger client. Existing Messenger users who already have their own contact lists are not affected by your default contact list.

Each contact list option is accompanied by a *Lock* button. When an option is unlocked, it can be overridden by changing the option setting on the Novell Messenger General page of individual User objects, or in the case of the contact list, by Messenger users themselves.

5 If you do not want an option to be changeable for individual Messenger users, click the *Lock* button next to it.

IMPORTANT: If you lock the contact list, users cannot change their contact lists in the Messenger client.

6 Click *Apply* to save the contact list settings.

3.4.6 Setting Up a Default Privacy List

7 If you do not want the default privacy list to be changeable for individual Messenger users, click the *Lock* button.

IMPORTANT: If you lock the privacy list, users cannot change their privacy lists in the Messenger client.

- 8 Click *Apply* to save the default privacy list.
- 9 Continue with "Selecting Default Display Attributes" on page 126.

IMPORTANT: If you lock the custom status list, users cannot create their own custom statuses in the Messenger client.

3.5.1 Using the Novell Messenger Download Page


The Novell Messenger download page is available to users as soon as you finish running the Messenger Installation program, as described in the *Messenger 2.1 Installation Guide*, and start the Messaging Agent, as described in Section 2.1, "Starting the Messaging Agent," on page 29.

In order for users to access the Novell Messenger download page in their Web browsers, you need to tell them the IP address or DNS hostname of the server where the Messaging Agent is running and the port number (8300 by default). So, for example, if you installed the Messaging Agent on a server with an IP address of 172.16.5.18, the Novell Messenger download page is:

http://172.16.5.18:8300

When users view this URL, they see the following page:

Figure 3-4 Novell Messenger Download Page



When users click the Novell Messenger link, they download the nvlmsgr.exe file from the \novell\nm\ma\software\client\win32 directory. By following the instructions on the download page, users can install and start the Messenger client quickly and easily.

3.5.2 Setting Up Auto-Update

You can require Messenger users to update their Messenger client software whenever a new version of the client is available

Client Download URLs: Click *Add* to specify each URL where the user's browser or the Messenger client are redirected when attempting to download the updated client software.

The URLs in the list you create are tried in the order you list them. Make sure that the Messenger nvlmsgr.exe file is available for download from each URL in the list. For more information, see "Configuring Your Web Server to Download the Messenger Client" on page 135.

Enable Client Download Through a Browser: Select this option so that users can download the updated Messenger client software from the Novell Messenger download page, as described in "Using the Novell Messenger Download Page" on page 132.

Update Message: If desired, type the message that you want Messenger users to see when they are notified about the Messenger client update.

4 If you want to require Messenger users to update, fill in the following fields:

Version: Specify the minimum acceptable version number for the Messenger client software.

Date: Click the *Calendar* button to specify the earliest acceptable date for the Messenger client software.

If you fill in the *Version* and/or *Date fields*, users cannot run the Messenger client until they update their software, unless you allow grace logins.

Grace Logins: Specify the number of times users can log in to the Messenger system without updating their Messenger client software.

If you leave the *Date* and *Version* fields blank, users can choose whether or not to update their Messenger client software when they are notified that a new version is available.

Client version information is stored on each user's workstation in the nmcl32.ver file.

5 Click *OK* to establish the update process.

When Messenger users start the Messenger client, they are notified whenever updated client software is available.

3.5.3 Configuring Your Web Server to Download the Messenger Client

By default, the Messaging Agent handles downloading Messenger client software to Messenger users. If this activity seems to interfere with its ability to handle its instant messaging functions in a timely manner, you can configure your Web server to download the client software instead. Before performing the following steps, you should already have created your Messenger system and have the Messenger agents running. You can download either Messenger client (Windows or Cross-Platform) from a Messenger system on any platform (NetWare, Linux, or Windows).

- 1 In ConsoleOne, browse to and right-click the Messenger Service object, then click *Properties*.
- **2** Click *Novell Messenger > Client Update*.
- **3** Click *Novell Messenger > Client Update*.

- 6 Click *OK* to close the Download URL dialog box, then click *OK* again to save the updated information on the Client Update page.
- 7 From the Messenger software subdirectory, copy the index.htm file and the msgricon.gif file to the primary document directory of your Web server.

On NetWare and Windows, the Messenger software directory is \novell\nm\ma\software. On Linux, it is /opt/novell/messenger/software.

If you want to provide the Novell Messenger download page in a language other than English, copy the index.htm file from the appropriate language subdirectory beneath the Messenger software directory.

8 Edit the index.htm file to remove all instances of ~down, for example:

- **9** Depending on the requirements of your Web server, save the file as either index.htm or index.html.
- **10** Under the primary document directory of your Web server, create a client subdirectory, then create a platform-specific subdirectory in it, to create the following directory structure:

primary_doc_dir/client/win32 primary_doc_dir/client/xplat/linux
primary doc dir/client/xplat/mac

- 11 From the platform-specific subdirectory (win32, linux, or mac) of the Messenger software directory, copy the appropriate Messenger file (nvlmsgr.exe, nvlmsgr.bin, or nvlmsgr.sit) into the corresponding primary doc dir platform-specific subdirectory.
- **12** In the platform-specific *primary_doc_dir* subdirectory, create an ASCII text file named files.txt with one of the following lines depending on your client platform:

client/win32/nvlmsgr.exe client/xplat/linux/nvlmsgr.bin client/xplat/mac/ nvlmsgr.sit

- **13** After typing the appropriate, platform-specific line shown in Step 12, press Enter so that there is an empty line at the end of the file.
- **14** Save the updated files.txt file.

- **15** Repeat Step 12 through Step 14 for each platform-specific subdirectory you created in Step 10, so that you have three files.txt files, one for each platform.
- 16 Restart the Messenger agents to put the list of client download URLs into effect.

You do not need to restart the Web server in order for Messenger users to be able to download the Messenger client software.

IMPORTANT: This information assumes that you are familiar with ZENworks for Desktops. For background information, or for help completing the ZENworks tasks outlined in the steps below, see the ZENworks for Desktops documentation at the Novell ZENworks documentation site (http://www.novell.com/documentation-index/index.jsp?category=ZENworks).

Understanding the Messenger Client .aot Files

The most effective way to create a Messenger client Application object is from an Application Object Template (.aot) file. If desired, you can use the ZENworks for Desktops snAppShot[™] utility to create a Messenger client .aot file, or you can use one of the predefined .aot files included with Messenger:

- english.aot: Creates an Application object you can use to install the English.
- multi.aot: Creates an Application object you can use to install all languages that are available except English.

The .aot files contain the basic information required to create Messenger client Application objects in Novell eDirectory. For example, the multi2.aot file can be used to create an Application object that, when associated with users, causes the English, Czech, Hungarian, Polish, and Russian versions of the Messenger client to be installed to a user's Windows workstation. For this to work, you must have already installed the files for these language versions to a location that is accessible to users.

Creating a Messenger Client Application Object

The following steps explain how to use ZENworks for Desktops 4 to create a Messenger client Application object from one of the .aot files. If you are using a different version of ZENworks for Desktops, the steps you need to complete might be slightly different.

- 1 Copy the contents of the \novellnm\ma\software\client\win32 directory to a location on a server that is accessible to all users (for example, \\server\volume\novell\messenger).
- 2 In ConsoleOne, right-click the container where you want to create the Messenger client Application object, then click *New* > *Object* to display the New Object dialog box.

3 In the list of objects, select *App:Application*, then click *OK* to display the New Application dialog box.

SOURCE_PATH: This is the directory from which the Messenger client will be installed. Specify the full path to the client directory (for example,

*server**volume*\novell\messenger). Unless all users have the same drive mapping to the volume, make sure you use a UNC path.

This path is saved as the SOURCE_PATH variable. If you need to change it later, you can do so on the Application object's Macros page (Application object > *Common* tab > Macros page).

TARGET_PATH: This is the workstation directory where the Messenger client will be installed. Specify a path relative to the user's workstation.

This path is saved as the TARGET_PATH variable. If you need to change it later, you can do so on the Application object's Macros page (Application object > *Common* tab > Macros page).

The MESSENGER_SERVER_ADDRESS and MESSENGER_SERVER_PORT variables provide the location of the Messaging Agent, so that users do not need to provide this information when starting the Messenger client.

If you used one of the multix.aot files to create the Application object, the Macros list includes a DEFAULT_LANGUAGE variable. This variable specifies the interface language that the Messenger client defaults to when it is installed. If necessary, individual users can change the language when they start the Messenger client. If you modify the default language, use the language codes listed under /l.

If you have users who use different language versions and you do not want them to be required to change the default language, you can use the same .aot file to create multiple Application objects. For each Application object, you should specify a default language and then associate the Application object with the users who might want that default language.

12 Configure any other Application object settings required to provide the performance or functionality you want.

For example, you can configure the Application object so that the Messenger client is installed immediately upon distribution to the user's workstation, without any intervention by the user. Or, you can change the locations where the Messenger client's icon is displayed. For information about Application object settings, see the ZENworks for Desktops documentation at the Novell Documentation Web site (http://www.novell.com/documentation-index/index.jsp?category=ZENworks).

After you associate the Application objects with the users you want, Novell Application Launcher[™] displays the Application object's icon on the users' workstations, if the workstation meets the operating system requirements. If the Application object's icon does not appear immediately, have the user refresh Novell Application Launcher.

13 If necessary, repeat the above steps to create additional Messenger client Application objects from the Messenger client .aot files.

3.6.1 Using the Configuration File (setup.cfg) When Installing the Windows Messenger Client

The Messenger configuration file (setup.cfg) controls how the Windows Messenger client software is installed by client users. It includes the following sections and parameters:

[NMSetup]

The [NMSetup] section of the setup.cfg file enables you to control the options the Messenger client Installation program presents to the user during installation.

Path=

Specify the path where you want the Installation program to install the client software.

ProgramFolder=

Specify the item on the *Start > Programs* menu where you want the Messenger client to appear. For example, you can specify Novell Messenger or GroupWise.

LaunchNow=

By default, the *Start GroupWise Messenger Now* check box on the Setup Complete page is selected. Specify No if you want it deselected by default when the user installs the client software.

ViewReadme=

By default, the *View the GroupWise Messenger Readme* check box on the Setup Complete page is selected. Specify No if you want it deselected by default when the user installs the client software.

IconOnDesktop=

By default, the *Put an Icon on the Desktop* check box on the Setup Complete page is selected. Specify No if you want it deselected by default when the user installs the client software.

LaunchOnStartup=

By default, the Messenger client starts when Windows starts. Specify No if you don't want it to start when Windows starts. Users then need to use the desktop icon to start the Messenger client.

ServerAddress=

Defaults to the IP address of the server where the Messaging Agent is installed. If you move the Messaging Agent to a different server, update this information to match. See "Changing the Messenger Server IP Address and Port Number" on page 152.

ServerPort=

Defaults to 8300. Specify a different port number if the default port number is already in use on the server. See "Changing the Messenger Server IP Address and Port Number" on page 152.

ForceAddressAndPort=

If you change the server address and/or port information, specify No if you want existing Messenger client installations to continue using the original server address and/or port while new Messenger client installations use the updated server and/or port information. Specify Yes for both existing and new installations to use the updated information.

If you do not set ForceAddressAndPort=Yes after changing the server address and port information, users need to use the /ipa and /ipp client startup switches to manually provide this information when they start the Messenger client or they need to update the Address and Port values of the \HKEY_CURRENT_USER\Software\Novell\Messenger\Login key in the Windows registry. Using the ForceAddressAndPort=Yes parameter makes life much easier for users. They are prompted to update their client software and the address and port information is automatically changed for them.

UseWindowsColors=

By default, the Messenger client uses its own custom color scheme. Specify Yes to use standard Windows colors instead.

ShowRememberPassword=

This setting controls whether the user sees the Remember Password option during the initial login to the client.

The default setting displays the Remember Password option on the GroupWise Messenger Login window. Setting ShowRememberPassword to No causes the Remember Password option to not display during the initial login.

After the initial login, this option is controlled by its setting in ConsoleOne.

[Languages]

The [Languages] section of the setup.cfg file enables you to control what languages are selected by default on the Language Selection page. Specify Yes for a language that you want selected by default. Specify No for each language that you want deselected by default. For example:

If you suppress the Language Selection page, all selected languages are automatically installed on users' workstations.

[Show Dialogs]

The [Show Dialogs] section of the setup.cfg file enables you to control what interactions take place when users install the Messenger client for the first time. If you choose to suppress a page, use the corresponding parameter in the [NMSetup] section to provide the information that the Installation program needs from the suppressed page.

HideAllDialogs=

Specify Yes for a completely non-interactive installation of the Messenger client. Provide all required information in the [NMSetup] section.

SelectDestination=

Specify No to suppress the Choose Destination Location page during installation. Make sure you have set the Path= parameter to the location where you want the client software to be installed on users' workstations.

SelectProgramFolder=

Specify No to suppress the Select Program Folder page during installation. Make sure you have set the ProgramFolder= parameter to the item on the *Start* > *Programs* menu where you want the Messenger client to appear.

LanguageSelect=

Specify No to suppress the Language Selection page during installation. Make sure you have specified Yes for each language in the [Languages] section that you want to be installed on users' workstations.

SetupComplete=

Specify No to suppress the Setup Complete page at the end of the installation. If you suppress this page, users cannot review the Messenger client Readme. Make sure you have set the LaunchNow= and IconOnDesktop= parameters to control whether the client starts automatically and whether users have desktop icons to start the client.

On Windows, the Messenger user does not need to be aware of this information because the Messenger server Installation program adds the network address and port information to the setup.cfg file that it installs into the \novell<nm<massftware<client<win32</pre> directory. When the user downloads the client software and installs it, the Messenger client Installation program reads the server information in the setup.cfg file and updates the Windows registry of the user's workstation with the information necessary for the Messenger client to start. This startup switch, as well as the /ipp switch, are only needed to override the server information automatically stored in the registry.

/keepalive

This regular communication between the Messaging Agent and the client prevents firewalls and routers from disconnecting connections that seem to be inactive. You can decrease the interval if a specific client user keeps getting unexpectedly disconnected. Use a setting of 0 (zero) to turn off the ping activity.

For the Windows client, the user's initial successful login is stored in the Windows registry and is used as the default thereafter. 3.6.4 Changing the Messenger Server IP Address and Port Number

When you install and start the Messaging Agent, it creates the nvlmsgr.exe file that users download in order to install the Messenger client. The information in this file includes the IP address of the server where the Messaging Agent is installed and the port number on which it listens for requests from Messenger clients so that users do not need to concern themselves with this information. If you need to move the Messaging Agent to a different server, so that it is using a different IP address and possibly port, each client installation needs to be updated with the new information.

- 1 Install, configure, and start the Messaging Agent on the new Messaging Agent server.
- 2 Edit the setup.cfg file in the following directory on the original Messaging Agent server:

\novell\nm\ma\software\client\win32

- **2a** Scroll down to the ServerAddress= line and provide the new IP address.
- **2b** On the ServerPort = line, provide a new port number if necessary.
- **2c** On the ForceAddressAndPort= line, specify Yes so that all client installations and updates receive the new information.
- **2d** Save and exit from the setup.cfg file.
- **3** Stop the Messaging Agent on the original server.
- **4** Delete the nvlmsgr.exe file from the following directory on the original server:

\novell\nm\ma\software\client\win32

5 Start the Messaging Agent again on the original server.

This creates a new nvlmsgr.exe file and, if you are using the auto-update feature as described in "Setting Up Auto-Update" on page 133, the clients automatically install the updated version of the client software, which includes the new address and port information. When the updated clients start, they connect to the Messaging Agent on the new server.

3.7 Excluding Users from Your Messenger System

The set of users that are included in your Messenger system are those users whose User objects are located in an eDirectory context listed in a scope profile or an LDAP profile. If you need to exclude specific users from your Messenger system even though their User objects fall within the scope of your Messenger system, you can do so.

If you want to maintain a list of excluded users, you can create a policy to govern the excluded users, as described in "Creating a User Policy" on page 118. On the General page of the Policy object, deselect *Enable Novell Messenger Services*. On the Used by page of the Policy object, list those users that you want to exclude from your Messenger system.

You can also edit the Novell Messenger General page of individual User objects and deselect *Enable Novell Messenger Services for individual users*.

Enabling and Managing Archiving

When you enable archiving, the Messaging Agent passes completed conversations to the Archive Agent for storage on disk. The Archive Agent saves the conversations, indexes them, and searches them when requested by authorized Messenger client users. If you do not need to archive everyone's conversations, you can set up a policy to determine whose conversations are archived and whose are not.

Archiving is optional. Because all users' conversations are stored together in the Messenger archive, archiving is only necessary if you need to retain conversations for legal reasons, for example to comply with a corporate e-mail retention policy that has been extended to instant messages.

4.1 Establishing the Master Archive Agent

If you installed the Archive Agent along with the Messaging Agent when you created your Messenger system, both Messenger agents were installed on the same server. This initial Archive Agent was automatically established as the master Archive Agent on the Archive page of the Messenger Service object.

To verify this:

- 1 In ConsoleOne[®], browse to and right-click the Messenger Service object, then click *Properties*.
- **2** Click *Novell Messenger > Archive*.

Observe that a randomly generated passphrase has been provided. The passphrase is used for encrypting conversations as they are saved into the archive. You can change the passphrase if you want.

3 To change the passphrase, type a string of characters in the *Passphrase* field.

A passphrase must be longer than 7 characters and can be up to 100 characters in length.

4 Click OK.

You might want to continue to run both Messenger agents on the same server. However, the Messaging Agent is CPU intensive because it handles users' conversations and eDirectory[™] searches in memory, and the Archive Agent is file intensive because it archives conversations and indexes the archive on disk. Therefore, you might want to run them on different servers.

If you want to continue running the initial Archive Agent on the same server with the Messaging Agent, skip to Section 4.2, "Starting the Archive Agent," on page 157.

If you want to install the Archive Agent on a different server from where the Messaging Agent is running:

- 1 In ConsoleOne, delete the initial Archive Agent object.
- 2 Run the Messenger Installation program as described in the Messenger 2.1 Installation Guide.
- **3** On the Install Components page, deselect *Messaging Agent* and *Administration Files*.

Messaging Agent:	Handles all message routing and presence notification for the system. A Novell Messenger system must have a Messaging Agent installed.
Archive Agent:	Handles archiving and searching of conversations. A Novell Messenger system with archiving enabled must have an Archive Agent installed.
Administration Files:	Install the files necessary to administer Novell Messenger through ConsoleOne.

4.2 Starting the Archive Agent

When you finish creating your Messenger system, the Installation program can start the Messenger agents for you. If you installed the Messenger agents on a Windows server, the Archive Agent console appears on the Windows server console.

4.2.1 Starting the NetWare Archive Agent

The Messenger Installation program creates the nmstart.ncf file in the Messenger agent installation directory (sys:\novell\nm by default). This file contains lines similar to the following example:

load sys:\novell\nm\ma\nmma.nlm @sys:\novell\nm\ma\strtup.ma
load sys:\novell\nm\aa\nmaa.nlm @sys:\novell\nm\aa\strtup.aa

If you are running the Archive Agent on a different server from where the Messaging Agent is running, edit the nmstart.ncf file and comment out the first line so that the Messaging Agent does not start when the nmstart.ncf file is run.

To start the Archive Agent manually:

1 Enter sys:\novell\nm\nmstart.ncf at the NetWare server console prompt.

The Archive Agent console appears.

To start the Archive Agent automatically when the NetWare server restarts:

1 Add the following line to the autoexec.ncf file in the sys:\system directory:

sys:\novell\nm\nmstart.ncf

If you want to start the Archive Agent in protected mode, you must be using LDAP access to eDirectory. See "Using LDAP Access for the Archive Agent" on page 163. In addition, when you stop the Archive Agent agent in protected mode, you must manually unload the address space.

- **1** At the Linux server, become root by entering su and the root password.
- 2 Change to the /etc/init.d directory.
- **3** To start the Archive Agent, enter the following command:

./novell-nmaa start

You can also use the stop, restart, and status options for these agents from the same directory.

Messenger agent log files are created in the /var/opt/novell/log/messenger directory. The Messenger agents can be monitored by using the agent Web consoles from your Web browser, as described in Section 2.5.2, "Using the Messaging Agent Web Console," on page 44.

Starting the Linux Archive Agent in a Terminal Window

To start the Archive Agent in a terminal window, run the Archive Agent executable.

- **1** At the Linux server, become root by entering su and the root password.
- **2** Change to the /opt/novell/messenger/bin directory.
- **3** To start the Archive Agent, enter the following command:

./nmaa @/etc/opt/novell/messenger/strtup.aa

Agent status information and messages are displayed in the terminal window.

To stop the Archive Agent when it is running in a terminal window, press Ctrl+C and the Archive Agent performs a normal shutdown.

- **3** Double-click nmaa.exe, then add the startup file (strtup.aa) to the command line. Example: nmaa.exe @strtup.aa
- 4 Click Next.
- **5** Select the Startup folder, provide a name for the shortcut, then click *Finish*.

Starting the Archive Agent as a Windows Service

To start the Archive Agent manually:

- 1 Click *Start* > *Settings* > *Control Panel*.
- **2** Double-click *Administrative Tools > Services*.
- 3 Right-click the Novell Messenger Archive Agent service, then click Start.

To start the Archive Agent automatically whenever the server restarts:

- 1 Click *Start* > *Settings* > *Control Panel*.
- **2** Double-click *Administrative Tools* > *Services*.
- **3** Right-click the *Novell Messenger Archive Agent* service, then click *Properties*.
- **4** Set *Startup Type* to *Automatic*.
- **5** Click *OK* to save the Windows service startup setting.

If you do not want to run the Messaging Agent along with the Archive Agent, make sure that the Novell Messenger Messaging Agent service is disabled.

To start the Archive Agent without a user interface on the Windows server desktop:

- 1 Click *Start* > *Settings* > *Control Panel*.
- **2** Double-click *Administrative Tools > Services*.
- **3** Right-click the *Novell Messenger Archive Agent* service, then click *Properties*.
- 4 Click Log On, then deselect Allow Service to Interact with Desktop.

If you suppress the Archive Agent console in this manner, the Archive Agent can still be monitored from the Archive Agent Web console, as described in "Using the Archive Agent Web Console and GroupWise Monitor" on page 174.

5 Click OK to save the Windows service logon setting.

4.2.4 Changing the eDirectory Access Method for Starting the Archive Agent

The Archive Agent cannot start if it cannot read its configuration settings from the Archive Agent object in Novell[®] eDirectory. During installation, an eDirectory access method was selected, as described in "Installing a Novell Messenger System" in the *Messenger 2.1 Installation Guide*.

1 Edit the Archive Agent startup file (strtup.aa).

On Linux, the startup file is located in /etc/opt/novell/messenger.

On Windows, the startup file is located in the Messenger Agent installation directory. You can edit the startup file from the Messaging Agent console. See "Controlling the Archive Agent from the Archive Agent Console" on page 174.

2 On Linux and Windows, comment out the /dirreplicaaddr switch.

On a NetWare server, this switch does not apply, because the eDirectory replica resides on the NetWare server.

- **3** Scroll down to the bottom of the startup file.
- **4** Remove the comment character (;) from the /ldap* switches and provide the required LDAP information.
- **5** Save the startup file.
- **6** Stop and then start the Archive Agent so that it reads its updated startup file and uses LDAP access to eDirectory.

Using Direct Access for the Archive Agent

1 Edit the Archive Agent startup file (strtup.aa).

On Linux, the startup file is located in /etc/opt/novell/messenger.

On Windows, the startup file is located in the Messenger Agent installation directory. You can edit the startup file from the Messaging Agent console. See "Controlling the Archive Agent from the Archive Agent Console" on page 174.

2 On a Linux and Windows, remove the comment character (;) from the /dirreplicaaddr switch and provide the IP address of the eDirectory replica that you want the Archive Agent to access.

On a NetWare server, this switch does not apply, because the eDirectory replica resides on the NetWare server.

- **3** Scroll down to the bottom of the startup file.
- **4** Comment out the /ldap* switches.

Removing the LDAP information causes the Archive Agent to access the eDirectory replica directly.

- **5** Save the startup file.
- 6 Stop and then start the Archive Agent so that it reads its updated startup file and uses direct access to eDirectory.

4.3 Enabling Archiving in Your Messenger System

If you want to archive the conversations of all Messenger users, select Archive Sessions on the General page of the Default Policy object, as described in "Editing the Default User Policy" on page 117. After you edit the default policy, you must stop and then start the Messenger agents in order to put the modified policy into effect throughout your Messenger system. Thereafter, they next time users log in to the Messenger system, their conversations are archived.

If you want to archive the conversations of some users but not others, you must create a policy that lists the users whose conversations you want to archive, as described in "Creating a User Policy" on page 118. You do not need to stop and then start the Messenger agents after creating the new policy. The next time the users governed by the policy log in to the Messenger system, their conversations will be archived.

When users' conversations are being archived, the GroupWise[®] Messenger client displays a page icon notifying users that their conversations are being logged into the archive.

4.4 Granting Authorized User Access to the Archive

The Messenger archive is a single archive containing the conversations of all Messenger users for whom archiving is enabled. Therefore, access to the archive should be granted only to users who can appropriately view everyone's conversations. Users who can search the Messenger archive must be added to the Messenger access control list (ACL).

- 1 In ConsoleOne, browse to and right-click the Messenger Service object, then click *Properties*.
- **2** Click *Novell Messenger > Archive ACL*.

3 Click *Add*, then browse to and select those users that you want to grant access to the Messenger archive.

You can select only User objects. You cannot select container objects, Group objects, Organizational Role objects, GroupWise Distribution List objects, and so on.

- 4 Repeat Step 3 for each context where User objects are located.
- 5 Click *OK* to save the Messenger archive access control list.
- 6 Stop and then start the Archive Agent to put the access control list into effect.
- 7 Have authorized users log out and back in to the Messenger system in order to add the Search Archive item on the File menu.

4.5 Configuring the Archive Agent in ConsoleOne

The advantage to configuring the Archive Agent in ConsoleOne, as opposed to using startup switches in the Archive Agent startup file, is that the Archive Agent configuration settings are stored in eDirectory.

- 1 In ConsoleOne, browse to and expand the Messenger Service object.
- 2 Select the Messenger Server object where the Archive Agent runs.

4.6 Enhancing Archive Security with SSL Encryption

Messenger archive security is initially established with the archive passphrase, as described in Section 4.1, "Establishing the Master Archive Agent," on page 155. The passphrase enables the Archive Agent to encrypt conversations as they are saved on disk.

Secure Sockets Layer (SSL) ensures secure communication between programs by encrypting the complete communication flow between the programs. The Messenger Installation program offered the opportunity to configure the Messenger agents for SSL encryption. If you did not set up SSL encryption during installation, you can easily do so after installation. You can use the same procedure for setting up SSL encryption for the Archive Agent as for the Messaging Agent. For instructions, see Section 2.3, "Establishing Messaging Security with SSL Encryption," on page 38.

4.7 Changing the Agent User Password

When the Messaging Agent and Archive Agent are installed, the user's eDirectory password that is used to read the configuration that starts the agents is stored in the startup file for each agent. Prior to Messenger 2.0.2 Hot Patch 1, this password was stored in plain text. By default in Messenger 2.0.2 Hot Patch 1, the password is obfuscated to prevent the password from being read.

If you want to check whether the password has been obfuscated, look in the startup files. The password is prepended with \$\$: if it has been obfuscated.

The GWMPassword utility is used to change the password in the startup file for both the Messaging Agent and the Archive Agent.

For additional information on how to use GWMPasword, see Section 2.4, "Changing the Agent User Password," on page 41.

4.7.1 Changing the Agent User Password On NetWare or Windows

Before starting to use the utility, you must verify the following prerequisites:

- If you are changing the password on a NetWare server, a drive must be mapped to the location of the startup file.
- If you are using the utility on a workstation and changing the password on a Windows server, a drive must be mapped to the location of the startup file.

To change the password:

- 1 In Windows, click Start > Run, then enter cmd to open a command window.
- **2** Use the following command to change the password:

```
c:\gwm202\server\utility\gwmpwd\gwmpwd.exe --startup=<path to startup
file> --password=<new password>
```

Replace *c*:*gwm202* with the location that the hot patch files where extracted.

4.7.2 Changing the Agent User Password on Linux

4 Fill in the following fields to configure the Messenger Archive:

Store Path: Specify the full path to the directory where you want the archive created.

By default, the archive is created in the store subdirectory of the Archive Agent installation directory. You should choose a location that has adequate disk space to store the expected volume of conversations for the amount of time for which they must be retained. If you need to move an existing archive to a location where additional disk space is available, see "Moving the Archive" on page 178.

Maximum File Size: Specify the maximum size of the archive file. The default is 10 MB compressed.

When an archive file reaches this size, a new archive file is started.

5 Fill in the following fields to configure QuickFinder[™] indexing for the archive:

Delay: Specify the number of hours after midnight when you want the Archive Agent to begin its first indexing cycle for the day. The default is 2 hours after midnight (2:00 a.m.)

Update Interval: Specify the number of hours between indexing cycles. The default is 4 hours. So, by default, the Archive Agent indexes conversations at 2:00 a.m., 6:00 a.m., 10:00 a.m., 2:00 p.m., 6:00 p.m., and 10:00 p.m. Increase the interval to index less frequently; decrease the interval to index more frequently. One hour is the smallest indexing interval you can specify.

Compress Interval: Specify the number of hours between index compression cycles. The default is 24 hours (once a day at the time specified in the *Delay* field).

- 6 Click OK to save the archive settings.
- 7 Stop and then start the Archive Agent to put the settings into effect.

From the Archive Agent console and Web console, you can perform indexing and compression for the archive at any time. See "Controlling the Archive Agent from the Archive Agent Console" on page 174 and "Using the Archive Agent Web Console and GroupWise Monitor" on page 174.

4.9 Establishing Archive Maintenance

The Messenger archive is stored in a database format that requires occasional maintenance:

4.9.1 Expiring Old Conversations

It might not be practical to store all conversations indefinitely. Establishing archive maintenance procedures keeps your archive current and eliminates obsolete conversations.

- **1** In ConsoleOne, browse to and right-click the Messenger Service object.
- 2 Click Properties > Novell Messenger > Archive.

3 Fill in the following fields to control when the Archive Agent performs maintenance on the archive, including when old conversations are expired and deleted from the Messenger archive and when the expiration process takes place.

Delay: Specify the number of hours after midnight when you want the Archive Agent to perform maintenance. The default is 2 hours after midnight (2:00 a.m.)

Interval: Specify how often to perform maintenance. The default is 4 hours.

Expire: Specify the number of days you want to keep conversations in the archive. The default is 90 days. Specify 0 (zero) to disable expiration and retain all conversations indefinitely.

- 4 Click *OK* to save the archive maintenance settings.
- **5** Stop and then start the Archive Agent to put the maintenance settings into effect.

When the Archive Agent expires conversations, it does not reduce the physical size of the Messenger archive. However, the archive does not grow again until the space reclaimed by expiring conversations has been filled.

4.9.2 Repairing the Archive

If the Messenger archive is damaged for any reason, you can repair it at the Archive Agent console and Web console. For instructions, see "Controlling the Archive Agent from the Archive Agent Console" on page 174 and "Using the Archive Agent Web Console and GroupWise Monitor" on page 174.



4.10.2 Using the Archive Agent Web Console and GroupWise Monitor

The Archive Agent Web console enables you to monitor and control the Archive Agent from any location where you have access to a Web browser and the Internet. This provides substantially more flexible access than the Archive Agent console, which can only be accessed from the server where the Archive Agent is running.

You can use the same procedure to set up the Archive Agent Web console as the Messaging Agent Web console. For instructions, see "Using the Messaging Agent Web Console" on page 44. In addition, you can compress the archive indexes and perform maintenance on the archive from the Web console.

As with the Messaging Agent, you can access the Archive Agent Web console from GroupWise Monitor. For setup and usage instructions, "Using GroupWise Monitor" on page 59.

4.10.3 Using Archive Agent Log Files

Error messages and other information about the Archive Agent are written to log files as well as displaying on the Archive Agent console. Log files can provide a wealth of information for resolving problems with Archive Agent functioning. On NetWare and Windows, the default location for log files is the logs subdirectory of the Archive Agent installation directory. On Linux, the default location is /var/opt/novell/log/messenger/aa.

You can use the same procedure for Archive Agent log files as for Messaging Agent log files. For instructions, see "Using Messaging Agent Log Files" on page 57.

4.10.4 Using Novell 6.5 Remote Manager

If the Archive Agent is running on a NetWare 6.5 server, you can use the IP Address Management feature in Novell Remote Manager (*NetWare Remote Manager > Manage Server > IP Address Management*) to view the IP address and port configuration for the Archive Agent. This is also true for the Messenger Agent running on a NetWare 6.5 server.

You access Novell Remote Manager by entering the following URL in a Web browser:

4.10.5 Using SNMP Monitoring Programs

You can monitor the Archive Agent from the Management and Monitoring component of Novell ZENworks[®] for Servers, ManageWise[®], or any other SNMP management and monitoring program. When properly configured, the Archive Agent sends SNMP traps to network management consoles for display along with other SNMP monitored programs. It also responds to requests for configuration and status information from SNMP management and monitoring programs.

You can use the same procedure for setting up the Archive Agent as for the Messaging Agent. For instructions, see "Using SNMP Monitoring Programs" on page 60.

4.11 Optimizing Archive Agent Performance


You can adjust how the Archive Agent functions to optimize its performance. Before attempting optimization, you should run the Archive Agent long enough to observe its efficiency and its impact on other network applications running on the same server. 4.11.1 Optimizing Connections between the Archive Agent and Messenger Users

- 3 Right-click the Archive Agent object, then click *Properties*.
- **4** Click *Agent* > *Performance*.



5 Fill in the following fields to configure how the Archive Agent communicates with Messenger users:

Maximum Number of Users: Specify the maximum number of Messenger users that you want the Archive Agent to be able to search the archive for at once. The default is 5120, which should be adequate for a very large Messenger system.

Client/Server Threads: Specify the number of client/server threads that you want the Archive Agent to start. The Archive Agent uses its client/server threads to search the archive for Messenger users, to communicate with the Messaging Agent in order to receive conversations to archive, and to maintain and index the archive.

The default number of client/server threads is 15. For a large Messenger system with archiving enabled for all users, you could increase the number to 50 or more, depending on the system resources of the server where the Archive Agent is running.

- 6 Click OK to save the Archive Agent performance settings.
- 7 Stop and then start the Messaging Agent to put the new performance settings into effect.

Corresponding Startup Switches: You can also use the /maxconns and /threads startup switches in the Archive Agent startup file to configure Archive Agent performance.

4.11.2 Optimizing the Connection between the Archive Agent and the Messaging Agent

By default, the Messaging Agent waits 5 seconds for a response when trying to contact the Archive Agent. If no response is received from the Archive Agent, the Messaging Agent tries again three more times. If all four attempts fail, the Messaging Agent reports an error, then waits 10 minutes before it tries again.

When the Messaging Agent attempts to send conversations to the Archive Agent, the Messaging Agent tries for 20 seconds before reporting an error.

On some networks, these wait intervals might not be sufficient when the Messaging Agent and the Archive Agent are running on different servers. As a result, the Messaging Agent might report an error when, by waiting longer, the needed connection or data transfer can take place.

Use the /mtpconnecttimeout switch in the Messaging Agent startup file to increase the number of seconds the Messaging Agent waits for a response from the Archive Agent before reporting an error.

Use the /mtpdatatimeout switch in the Messaging Agent startup file to increase the number of seconds the Messaging Agent attempts to send conversations to the Archive Agent before reporting an error.

4.12 Managing the Archive Server

As your Messenger system grows and evolves, you might need to reconfigure the server where the Archive Agent runs or move Archive Agent directories to different locations.

4.12.1 Binding the Archive Agent to a Specific IP Address

On a server with multiple IP addresses, the Archive Agent binds to all available IP addresses and Messenger clients can communicate with the Archive Agent on all available IP addresses unless you bind it to a specific address.

You can use the same procedure to bind the Archive Agent as Messaging Agent. See "Binding the Messaging Agent to a Specific IP Address" on page 67

4.12.2 Changing the Archive Server's IP Address or DNS Host Name

If you change the IP address or DNS hostname of the server where the Archive Agent is running, you must update the server information for your Messenger system as well.

You can use the same procedure for the Archive Agent as for the Messaging Agent. See "Changing the Messaging Server's Network Address" on page 68.

4.12.3 Moving the Archive Agent Working Directory

The Archive Agent uses its working directory for saving various temporary files during archiving and indexing. By default, the Archive Agent and the Messaging Agent share the same working directory if they are running on the same server.

You can use the same procedure to move the Archive Agent working directory as to move the Messaging Agent working directory. See "Moving the Messaging Agent Working Directory" on page 69.

4.12.4 Moving the Archive

Depending on the volume of conversations to archive and the length of time conversations must be retained, the Messenger archive can grow to be quite large. On NetWare and Windows, the default location for the archive is \novell\nm\aa\store. On Linux, the default is /var/opt/novell/ messenger/aa/store. If necessary, you can move it to a different location where more disk space is available. However, the archive must reside on the same server where the Archive Agent runs.

- **1** Stop the Archive Agent.
- 2 Copy the Messenger archive (store directory) to the desired location.
- 3 In ConsoleOne, browse to and expand the Messenger Service object.
- **4** Expand the Messenger Server object where the Archive Agent runs, then double-click the Archive Agent object.

4.12.5 Maintaining the Archive Store

When messages are added to the archive store, they are not immediately indexed. Before a user can search for a message in the archive, it must be indexed. You can set when the store starts indexing, the interval time between indexing, and how long a message should be kept in the archive.

- **3** Expand the Messenger Server object where the Archive Agent runs, then double-click the Archive Agent object.

4.12.6 Moving the Archive Queue Directories

When archiving is enabled, the Messaging Agent passes conversations to the Archive Agent when the conversations are completed. If the Messaging Agent cannot communicate with the Archive Agent when it has a conversation to archive, it saves the conversation in its holding directory (queue) until it can communicate with the Archive Agent again. When the Archive Agent receives a conversation to archive, if it is already busy processing other conversations, it temporarily stores the conversation in its holding directory (queue). Either of these holding queues can be moved if necessary.





By default users are not allowed to create chat rooms. However, you can enable this functionality for all users, for a user policy, or for a certain user.

- 1 Right-click either the default policy (all users), a user policy (users governed by the policy), or a user, then click *Properties*.
- **2** Select Allow Users to Create Chat Rooms.
- **3** Click *OK* to save the settings.

This must be a secure URL. If you try to specify a non-SSL URL, ConsoleOne automatically makes it secure by converting the URL from http to https.

- **4** Select *Allow clients to authenticate using Messenger credentials* if you want to enable users to launch Conferencing without needing to enter their Conferencing login credentials.
- 5 Click OK.

7.1 Limiting Physical Access to Messenger Servers

Servers where Messenger data resides should be kept physically secure, so unauthorized persons cannot gain access to the server consoles.

7.2 Securing File System Access

In ConsoleOne[®], Server objects for servers where Messenger agents reside should be assigned appropriate trustees and rights to prevent access from unauthorized persons.

For additional data security, encrypted file systems should be used on servers where Messenger agents and archives reside.

7.3.1 Enabling SSL for Client/Server Connections

All the connections between the client and the server should be configured to use SSL. To do this, SSL must be configured for the agents. For information on configuring SSL for the agents and for the client, see "Creating Your Messenger System" for NetWare[®] and Windows and "Configuring the Linux Messenger Agents for SSL" for Linux in the *Messenger 2.1 Installation Guide*. To secure the client, simply use the port number specified for secure connections when connecting to the server.

7.3.2 Enabling SSL for the Message Transfer Protocol

When installing the agents, you have the option to configure SSL for the agents. If you chose to use SSL for the connection between the agents and the clients, the Message Transfer Protocol is automatically configured to use SSL as well. For more information, see "Creating Your Messenger System" for NetWare and Windows and "Configuring the Linux Messenger Agents for SSL" for Linux in the *Messenger 2.1 Installation Guide*.

Configuring SSL for the Message Transfer Protocol After Installation

In order for the Message Transfer Protocol to use SSL, you must enable SSL for the agents. If you chose not to use SSL during the installation, you can configure SSL for the agents in ConsoleOne.

Before the agents and the Message Transfer Protocol can use SSL encryption, you must send a Certificate Signing Request (CSR) to a Certification Authority (CA) and receive a public certificate file in return. The CSR includes the hostname of the server where the Messaging Agent runs. The Messaging Agent and the Archive Agent can use the same certificate if they run on the same server. The CSR also includes your choice of name and password for the private key file that must be used with each certificate. This information is needed when configuring the Messaging Transfer Protocol to use SSL encryption. For more information, see Section 2.3.1, "Generating a Certificate Signing Request and Private Key," on page 39.

After you have a public certificate and a private key file available on the server where the Messaging Agent runs, you are ready to configure the Messaging Agent to use SSL encryption.

- **3** Click *Agent > Security*.

4 Fill in the following fields:

Certificate Path: This field defaults to \novell\nm\certs for NetWare and Windows, and / opt/novell/messenger/certs for Linux.

IMPORTANT: The certificate path must be located on the same server where the Messenger agents are installed. If your SSL certificate and key file are located on a different server, you must copy them into the directory specified in the *Certificate Path* field so they are always accessible to the Messenger agents.

SSL Certificate: Browse to and select the public certificate file. Or, if it is located in the directory specified in the *Certificate Path* field, you can simply type the filename.

SSL Key File: Browse to and select your private key file. Or, if it is located in the directory specified in the *Certificate Path* field, you can simply type the filename.

Set Password: Provide the key file password you established when you submitted the certificate signing request.

Enable SSL for Client/Server: Select this option to enable SSL encryption for your client and server.

Enable SSL for Message Transfer Protocol: Select this option to enable SSL encryption for your Messenger Transfer Protocol.

- **5** Click *OK* to save the SSL settings.
- 6 Restart the Messaging Agent to begin using SSL encryption.

7.4.1 Enabling SSL for LDAP

You should use LDAP instead of direct access mode if the eDirectory[™] tree is on a different machine than the agents. When connecting with LDAP, SSL should be used to secure the connection. For additional information on how to secure the LDAP connection, see "eDirectory Access and Authentication" in the *Messenger 2.1 Installation Guide*.

7.4.2 Creating a Proxy User for LDAP Access

Messenger can be configured to remember passwords for the client login. However, this can cause security concerns. If a workstation is left unlocked, anyone can log in as that user if the Remember Password setting is selected. In addition, some third-party software packages, such as Gaim, might store the passwords in plain text.

For security reasons, the ability to remember passwords should be disabled. For information on how to disable the Remember Password option, see Section 3.4.3, "Customizing Messenger Client Features," on page 120.

The history files are stored as XML files, so anyone with access to the machine can view the files. For maximum security, the History option should be disabled. For information on how to disable the History option, see Section 3.4.3, "Customizing Messenger Client Features," on page 120.

Saved Conversation Security

A saved conversation is stored as a text file, so anyone with access to the machine can view the file. For maximum security, the ability to save conversations should be disabled. For information on how to do this, see Section 3.4.3, "Customizing Messenger Client Features," on page 120.

7.5.3 Using Scopes as Security

When the Messenger system is created, a default scope profile is created, and you are prompted for the location of users to add to the default scope profile. You can also create custom scope profiles. Users can only see users in contexts defined by their scope profiles. Multiple scope profiles can be created with different ranges of contexts. These scope profiles can be assigned to users to limit the other users they can see. For example, many companies create a separate scope profile for executives, to allow them to use Messenger but not be seen or accessed by other users. This could also be used for different departments or business units.

To create a new Messenger scope profile:

- 1 In ConsoleOne, browse to and expand the Messenger Service object.
- 2 Right-click the Scope Container object, then click New > Object.
- 3 Select nnmScopeProfile, then click OK.

- 4 Specify the name of the scope profile, then select *Define additional properties*.
- 5 Click OK.
- 6 Click Add.
- 7 Specify the context for the users to be added to the new scope, then select *Include sub-contexts* to include sub-contexts if desired.
- 8 Click *OK* twice.
- **9** Right-click a User object to add a user, or click a Policy object to add a group of users assigned to a policy, then click *Properties*.
- **10** Click the *Novell Messenger* > *General* Tab.
- **11** In the *Scope profile* box, specify the new scope profile, then click *OK*.
- **12** Restart the Messenger agents.
