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1.1 Overview

Novell® Open Workgroup Suite Small Business Edition (NOWS SBE) is the first workgroup suite for small businesses to provide a flexible solution based on proven open standards-based software. The Novell suite features a simple yet customizable installation process along with remote management capabilities. This means that solution providers can remotely manage their small business customers' IT infrastructures, thus reducing costs and improving service.

The Novell Open Workgroup Suite Small Business Edition also has a newly developed integration layer that makes it easier for resellers and service providers to integrate their specialized products into a solution. The suite is supported by popular business software applications certified to work with SUSE[®] Linux Enterprise Server (SLES). Novell Open Workgroup Suite Small Business Edition includes Novell Groupwise[®] for e-mailing and calendaring; Novell Open Enterprise Server (OES) for advanced storage management, user and rights administration, and clustering and failover capabilities; SUSE Linux Enterprise Desktop (SLED) from Novell for complete desktop productivity; and the Novell edition of the popular office productivity suite, OpenOffice.org, for Windows* and Linux.

NOWS SBE 2.0 represents an upgrade from SLES 9 to SLES 10 SP1 as well as an upgrade from OES 1 to OES 2. All updates are made through the Novell Customer Center.

1.3.1 Backup, Restore, and Recovery

- Personal File Backup (iFolder): Novell iFolder is a simple and secure storage solution that enables you to back up, access, and manage your personal files from anywhere, at any time. After you have installed iFolder, you simply save your files locally—as you have always done—and iFolder automatically updates the files on your network server and delivers them to the other machines you use.
- Network Backup (Amanda): Amanda allows you to set up a single backup server to back up
 multiple hosts to a tape-based or disk-based storage system. Amanda uses native dump and
 GNU tar facilities and can back up a large number of workstations and servers running various
 versions of Linux, UNIX or Microsoft* Windows operating systems.

1.3.2 Business Applications

OpenOffice.org: OpenOffice.org is a full-featured office suite. It includes word processing, presentation, spreadsheet, and database applications.

1.3.3 Collaboration Groupware and Messaging

• E-Mail and Collaboration (GroupWise): GroupWise is a set of tools that keeps your employees connected to clients and each other. The system comes with e-mail, calendaring, and instant messaging to be set up according to your company needs.

1.3.4 File, Print, and Fax

- Print Services (iPrint): iPrint is a network printing service that allows everyone to print at a
 centralized location. iPrint extends print services securely across multiple networks and
 operating systems.
- Windows File and Print Sharing (Samba): The Samba file and print sharing service for Windows enables you to configure your network with the security of Linux and still be able to access files on your Windows servers.
- Fax Server (HylaFAX): HylaFAX is the leading fax server for UNIX-like computer systems.
 It uses a client-server design and supports the sending and receiving of faxes, as well as text pages, on any scale from low to very high volumes, making use of large numbers of modems if necessary.

1.3.5 Security Management

- Anti-Virus (ClamAV): Clam AntiVirus is an anti-virus toolkit for UNIX designed especially for e-mail scanning on mail gateways. It provides a number of utilities, including a flexible and scalable multi-threaded daemon, a command line scanner, and an advanced tool for automatic database updates. The core of the package is an anti-virus engine available in the form of a shared library.
- VPN Server (OpenVPN): OpenVPN is a component that enables users to work remotely. A
 Virtual Private Network (VPN) allows users to connect securely to your internal business
 network and conduct business transactions with the same functionality as they do within the
 office.
- Firewall (IPTables): A firewall is a hardware or software device configured to permit, deny, or
 proxy data through a computer network that has different levels of trust. Novell Open
 Workgroup Suite Small Business Edition 2.0 includes a fully-configurable firewall service to
 keep out unwanted traffic and intruders.

1.3.6 Systems Management

- Dynamic Local User: If you have Windows on desktops, you can use the Dynamic Local User component to synchronize the Novell Client™ with the Windows client so that login is seamless to your users.
- **Directory Services (eDirectory):** eDirectory™ manages user identities and is the core of all rights and privileges in your NOWS SBE network.
- **Helpdesk:** Helpdesk aids administrators in tracking trouble calls and giving end users the ability to submit trouble tickets without picking up the phone.
- Management Tools (iManager): This is a role-based tool for network and systems management of your environment through a consolidated Web interface.

- DHCP: Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) enables your server to dynamically assign IP addresses as clients need them instead of statically assigning an IP address to each of the clients.
- **DNS:** Dynamic Name Server (DNS) is a service used to link a common name to an IP address for easy location and searching of resources over TCP/IP.
- VPN Server (OpenVPN): Remote access software used to connect securely to your company files when you are away from the office.
- Remote Desktop (TightVNC): This software gives your administrators the ability to remotely manage and assist end users with questions and tasks.

1.5.1 Server

By accepting the default partitioning information, the installation overwrites all existing files on the server. Change this configuration if you plan to install NOWS SBE 2.0 on an existing partition. Verify that the server does not see any partitions or devices that you do not want formatted and wiped. If components are installed while connected to a Storage Area Network (SAN), there is the potential to wipe out any partitions and data that it sees.

You also need to make sure that your server is plugged into a network where DHCP is installed.

1.5.2 Firewall (IPTables)

Below is a table with the typical ports that need to be opened on your firewall for each component.

1.5.3 Component Install Order

Begin component installation with eDirectory, then install iManager. You need iManager to manage iPrint, iFolder, Helpdesk, and GroupWise, (as well as eDirectory).

If you chose to install both MailScanner and GroupWise, be sure to install GroupWise first.

1.5.4 Creating a New Directory

Before you create a new eDirectory tree, you should define a naming standard. A consistent naming scheme provides a guideline for network administrators who will add, modify, or move objects within the eDirectory tree. 1.5.5 NetWork Backup (Amanda)

If you choose to install Amanda with a tape drive instead of installing on your hard drive, you might need information about supported tape drives. See the Amanda Documentation Web site (http://www.amanda.org/docs/AMANDA-docs.html).

1.5.6 E-Mail and Collaboration (GroupWise)

If you are installing GroupWise and MailScanner, when you install the GroupWise Internet Agent you are given the opportunity to assign the Internet Agent a different port (the default is 26) so that the two programs do not conflict. Incoming mail from the Internet to the GroupWise system is then accepted by MailScanner on port 25 (SMRP's default), scanned, and delivered to the Internet Agent, which accepts non-standard mail on port 26.

1.5.7 Helpdesk

You need an e-mail account designated for notifications and workflows for the Helpdesk component. You can use an existing account or create one named support@yourdomain.com or helpdesk@yourdomain.com.

2.1 Installing Novell Workgroup Suite Small Business Edition

Verify that you have one disk with the Novell® Open Workgroup Suite Small Business Edition 2.0 installation files, or download the installation ISO from http://www.download.novell.com to a location of your choice and burn it to a DVD. The download is 5 GB and takes a moment to complete.

If you use a VMware* or other virtualized environment session instead of a physical server, make sure to designate the boot sequence to boot from the CD-ROM.

2.1.1 Beginning the Installation

- 1 Insert the NOWS SBE DVD into the DVD drive.
- **2** Boot the server. You are presented with a splash screen. Using the Down-arrow key, select Installation, then press Enter.
- **3** The first page is the End User License Agreement (EULA). Read through the agreement and click *I Agree* to advance to the next page.
- **4** After the initial files have been loaded into the system, you are prompted to set up the initial configuration of your server on the Installation Settings window. You now have the following two options:
 - If you do not want to change any of the settings and choose to keep the defaults, just click *Accept* in the lower right corner of the window. A Confirm Installation message appears; if you are satisfied with the default, click *Install*.
 - If you want to change any of the settings, click *Change* and select the setting you want to modify. Repeat this task until all changes are complete. If you are satisfied with your changes, click *Accept* in the lower right corner of the Installation Settings main window. A Confirm Installation message appears; if you are satisfied with your changes, click *Install*.

IMPORTANT: Do not change the configurations for the Software settings. Doing so causes your install to fail.

- **5** On the Network Configuration window, if you want to change any of the network settings, click *Change* and select the setting you want to modify. If you do not want to make any changes, click *Next*.
 - You are then presented with an IP address at the server prompt so you can move to the browser-based portion of the installation and configuration. Make a note of the IP address; you need it to access the Web site where you continue the installation. You have now completed the base installation of the server.
- **6** If you receive an IP address of https://127.0.0.1:8181 or https://:8181 instead of a valid IP address, DHCP is not functioning. Complete the following steps:
 - **6a** Verify that you are connected to the network with your DHCP server.
 - **6b** At the command line, log in as root without a password. The default password is novel1.
 - **6c** Enter the following command: /etc/init.d/network restart. You can also enter renetwork restart

2.1.2 Web Installation and Configuration

IMPORTANT: You must begin your component download with eDirectory[™] and iManager. These two software components help you to manage many of the remaining components.

If you want to install GroupWise and MailScanner on the same server, use the *Add/Remove* function to add MailScanner only after GroupWise is installed. Adding these two applications simultaneously at the initial install might cause the GroupWise install to fail.

- 1 Type the link supplied at the end of your server installation in your Web browser and press Enter to bring up the first page of the Web installation.
- **2** The first page you see is the End User License Agreement (EULA). Read through the agreement and click *I Agree* to advance to the next page.
- **3** The next page is Network Settings. Verify the settings or add the correct information.
 - **IP Address:** The address should be the one from the initial setup of your server operating system. Verify that this is accurate.
 - Netmask: Verify the netmask from your network.
 - Gateway: Verify the gateway from your network.
 - **DNS Entry:** Verify the IP address of your DNS server.
 - **Host:** Specify a name for your server. The hostname should be the same as your server. You should not include special characters in the name of your server.
 - **Domain:** The Domain should match the name of your Internet domain name.
- **4** After you have specified the correct information, click *Next*.
- **5** You are then advanced to the License Key page. Specify your contact e-mail address and the license keys that were provided to you, then click *Next*.
- **6** Click *Check for Updates*. If updates are found, select *Install Updates*. After the check is complete, click *Next*.

- **7** On the User Information page, specify the password information for the administrator login. You have two options:
 - Basic Setup: Specify a password for the NOWS SBE Administrator. The server root password will be the same.
 - Advanced Mode: Click *Advanced Mode*. This allows you to specify a separate password for the NOWS SBE Administrator (sbsadmin) and for the server admin.

IMPORTANT: The difference between these two passwords is that the NOWS Administrator password enables you to add, remove, or configure components on your NOWS server from the NOWS Admin console. The server password is what you use to configure or update your server from the console. If you do not choose to make each password different, then the passwords are the same as the NOWS Administrator password you have chosen. Passwords must be at least five characters long and cannot include any special characters.

When you are at the Install Additional Components page, you can install some, all, or none of the components. If you choose to install none of the components at this time, you can add components from the NOWS Admin GUI later. The components have been grouped together with similar software types for easy location, often appearing in multiple locations.

- **8** Do one of the following:
 - If you choose not to install components, click *Next*, and then on the Install Additional Components page, click *Next* again. On the Component Installation page, click *Install*. Click *Continue to Administration*. To log out, click the red button next to *You are logged in as*.
 - If you do choose to install components now, select components on the Install Additional Components page. Click *Continue to Administration* to begin the configuration of your chosen NOWS components.

2.1.3 Configuration and Basic Administration

This section assumes that you have completed Section 2.1.1, "Beginning the Installation," on page 19 and Section 2.1.2, "Web Installation and Configuration," on page 20.

1 Log in to the administration page with the username of sbsadmin and the password you chose during the installation.

At the administration console, you can install, uninstall, configure, and update components. Help links are also here to assist you with questions about your new NOWS server.

From this page, you can also manage your server, environment, and users. If you grant users access to the NOWS SBE administration console with user privileges, they can get needed resources for their desktop computers.

2 To log out, click the red button in the upper left-hand corner of the Web page next to *You are logged in as*. This logs you out of the session and brings you back to the login screen.

Products and Services

When you click *Products and Services*, you can view additional information on installed components. Under *Select Component*, click the component's name to populate *Desktop Downloads*, *Help Links*, *Management Links*, and *Remote Administration*.

Add/Remove

This link allows you to add and remove components. To view all components, click *All* under *Available Software*. You can also view components in the following categories: *Backup Restore and Recovery, Business Applications, Collaboration Groupware and Messaging, File Print and Fax, Security Management*, and *Systems Management*. To uninstall a component, click *Uninstall* under *Installed Software*.

Desktop Downloads

This link allows you to search for desktop applications that can be installed on user desktops. Under *Choose Operating System*, specify the appropriate operating system. Under *Choose Component*, select the component you are searching for. You can also specify a keyword for your search. 2.3 Configuring Components

Use the components interface to add components to or remove components from your server. Under *Components*, select *Add/Remove*. Under *Available Software*, click *All*. A list of possible component installations appears. To install a component, click *Install* for that component.

IMPORTANT: You must begin your component download with eDirectory and iManager. These two software components help you to manage many of the remaining components.

To start the eDirectoryTM component install, click Add/Remove under Components, then click All and select eDirectory. Finally, decide which installation type you want to use:

- Basic: Installs a new eDirectory tree.
- Advanced New Tree: Installs a new eDirectory tree with more options.
- Advanced Existing Tree: Installs this server into an existing eDirectory tree.
- Advanced Use Remote Tree: Use this option when there is already an eDirectory installed
 on a dedicated server and you want components that depend on eDirectory to point to the
 existing tree.

3.1 Installing eDirectory Basic

This option installs a new eDirectory tree on your server with default options.

- **1** In the *Components* panel of the NOWS SBE administration page, click *Add/Remove*, then click *All* in the Add/Remove console, then click *Install* in the eDirectory panel.
- **2** A Recommended Components page appears. Read it and click *Continue*.
- **3** Select *Basic* installation, then click *Next*.
- **4** Specify a name for the new eDirectory tree. Do not use special characters when naming your tree.
- **5** Specify an organization name for your eDirectory.
 - This will be the name of the eDirectory container that the server is installed into. Do not use special characters when specifying your organization name.
- **6** Review the settings. To make changes, click the *Back* button. To proceed with the installation, click *Next*. Wait for the eDirectory files to unpack.
- **7** Basic eDirectory installation is now complete. Click *Finish* to return to the available software page. eDirectory is now listed on the installed software list and can be launched from the eDirectory administration link.

3.2 Installing eDirectory Advanced - New Tree

This option installs a new eDirectory tree on your server and allows you to specify many of the parameters, such as server context and LDAP ports.

1 In the *Components* panel of the NOWS SBE administration page, click *Add/Remove*, then click *All* in the Add/Remove panel, then click *Install* in the eDirectory panel.

- **2** A Recommended Components page appears. Read it and click *Continue*.

When you create your GroupWise system, GroupWise snap-ins are added to your ConsoleOne installation and GroupWise objects are created in Novell[®] eDirectory. As you manage your GroupWise system, you use ConsoleOne to create additional GroupWise objects, modify GroupWise object properties, and so on.

NOTE: Because the GroupWise snap-ins to ConsoleOne are required in order to work with GroupWise objects, you cannot use other network management tools, such as Novell iManager, to administer your GroupWise system. Also, you should not use older network management tools, such as NetWare[®] Administrator, to administer your GroupWise system, unless your GroupWise system includes legacy gateways that require such tools to administer the corresponding Gateway objects and their properties.

Because GroupWise is a cross-platform product, you might have components of your GroupWise system located on NetWare servers, Linux servers, and Windows servers. You can run ConsoleOne on Windows or Linux to manage GroupWise domains and post offices located on any of these platforms.

It provides a number of utilities, including a flexible and scalable multi-threaded daemon, a command line scanner, and an advanced tool for automatic database updates. The core of the package is an anti-virus engine available in the form of a shared library.

- Clam Archive Max Recursion: Specify the Clam archive maximum compression ratio.
 Any file that has a compression ratio above this value is marked as a virus. A value of 0 disables this limit.
- Clam Archive Max Files to Scan: Specify the maximum number of files to scan within an archive. A value of 0 disables this limit.
- Clam Archive Max Compression Ratio: Specify the Clam compression ratio. Any file
 that has a compression ratio above this value is marked as a virus. A value of 0 disables
 this limit.
- Clam Archive Limit Memory Usage: Select the check box to enable a slower but more memory-efficient decompression algorithm. This only affects the bzip2 decompressor.
- Clam Block Encrypted Archives: Select the check box to mark encrypted archives as viruses.
- Clam Archive Block Max: Select the check box to mark archives as viruses when the archive max files, archive max file size, or archive max recursion limit is reached.
- **5** Click *Next* to continue.
- **6** Select the appropriate runtime parameters.
 - Clam Max Connection Queue Length: Specify the maximum length for the queue of pending connections.
 - Clam Stream Max Length: Specify that the Clam stream maximum length connection is closed when the data size limit is exceeded. The value should match your mail transport agent's (MTA) limit for a maximum attachment size.
 - Clam Max Threads: Specify the maximum number of threads running at the same time.
 - Clam Data Read Timeout: Specify the time in seconds to wait for data from a client socket before going to timeout.
 - Clam Idle Job Timeout: Specify the time in seconds to wait for a new job before going into timeout.
 - Clam Max Directory Scan Recursion: Specify the maximum depth to which directories are scanned.
 - Clam Self Check of Software: Specify the time in seconds to perform internal sanity checks, such as database integrity and freshness.
 - Clam Run as User: Run as a selected user (Clam must be started by root).
 - Clam Virus Event Command Execution: Enable the execution of a command when a virus is found.
 - Clam Follow File Symlinks: Select the check box to enable following of regular file symlinks.
 - Clam Follow Directory Symlinks: Select the check box to enable following of directory symlinks.
 - Clam Allow Supplementary Groups: Select the check box to allow the initialization of supplementary group access (Clam must be started by root).
 - Clam Exit if Out of Memory Condition Exists: Select the check box to enable stopping the daemon when libelamav reports an out-of-memory condition.

 - Clam Log File Unlock: Select the check box to disable log file locking. By default, the log file is locked for writing to protect against running ClamAV multiple times. If you want to run another ClamAV, copy the configuration file, change the Log File variable, and run the daemon with the -config-file option.
 - Clam Log Event Time: Select the check box to enable an event's time to be logged.
 - Clam Log Event Messages to Syslog: Select the check box to use the system logger.
 This can work together with LogFile.

OpenVPN is a Virtual Private Network (VPN) package for creating point-to-point encrypted tunnels between host computers. A VPN allows users to authenticate and connect securely to the internal business network. Although it is not required, you should install IPTables before installing OpenVPN.

 - Allow VPN Clients Access to Internal Network: This determines whether to allow VPN clients to route through the VPN server to the internal network or not.
- **4** Review the settings of the installation. To make a change, click *Back*. To proceed with the installation, click *Next*.
- **5** The OpenVPN installation is now complete. Click *Finish* to proceed to the available software page. OpenVPN is now listed on the installed software list.

15.2 Installing OpenVPN Advanced

- 1 Click Add/Remove > All, then scroll down to VPN Server (OpenVPN) and click Install.
- **2** Click *Advanced*, then click *Next*.
- 3 Specify the OpenVPN advanced network configuration.
 - Server IP Address for VPN Interface: The IP address to be set to the assigned address
 of the interface that will be accepting VPN connections. If a system has multiple network
 interfaces, only one of them can be used for the VPN server.
 - Virtual IP Address Network: Virtual IP network range (such as 192.168.1.0) to use for VPN network or auto for automatic network detection
 - VPN Network Mask: Network mask (such as 255.255.255.0) of the VPN network or auto for automatic detection.
 - **Port to Use for VPN Traffic:** Port to use for VPN traffic. The default is 1194, but it can be anything above 1024 (1194 is highly recommended for best results).

- **Protocol to Use for VPN Traffic:** The protocol to use for VPN traffic, either UDP or TCP (the default is UDP for better performance).
- IP Address or FQDN of VPN Server: IP address or fully qualified domain name that VPN clients will connect to (such as vpn.yourcompany.com or 192.168.1.1).
- Allow Multiple VPN Clients to Share a Certificate: OpenVPN can allow multiple simultaneous connections from clients using the same certificate, but this is not advised.
- Allow VPN Clients Access to Internal Network: Select this option to enable access.
- **4** Specify your OpenVPN certificate configuration.
 - Country of VPN Server: Your country.
 - City of VPN Server: The city of your VPN server.
 - The State or Province of Your VPN Server: The state of your VPN server.
 - Organization Name: The name of your organization.
 - Hostname for Key: Unique hostname for this server, which will be embedded in the key.
 - E-mail Address for Certificate: An e-mail address to be displayed with the certificate.
 - Key Size in bits for Diffie Helman Key: The Diffie Helman Key Size determines the size of the key used for the initial handshake between the VPN client and server. The larger the key, the more secure it is, but it also takes much longer to generate during install and takes slightly more time for each VPN client to connect. 2048 provides the best balance between security and speed. 1024 is less secure but faster.
- **5** Review the settings. To make a change, click *Back*. To proceed with the installation, click *Next*.
- **6** The OpenVPN advanced installation is now complete. Click *Finish* to proceed to the available software page. OpenVPN is now listed on the installed software list and can be administered from the OpenVPN administration page.

The Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) enables your server to provide IP addresses as clients need them instead of manually assigning addresses to client computers.

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DNS, or Domain Name System, is an Internet service that translates domain names into IP addresses. Because domain names are alphabetic, they're easier to remember. However, the Internet is actually based on IP addresses. Every time you use a domain name, a DNS service must translate that name into the corresponding IP address. For example, the domain name www.example.com might translate to 198.105.232.4.

Uninstalling Components

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The uninstall tool allows you to perform a component uninstall. Removing a component is the same whether you used a Basic or Advanced install.

NOTE: To uninstall eDirectory[™], you must first uninstall iManager.

Uninstall does not always completely remove a package. Manual removal of configuration files and binaries might be required. However, this should not affect your system's performance.

- **1** To uninstall a component, click *Add/Remove*.
- **2** Click *Uninstall* beside the component you want to remove.
- **3** Click *Uninstall* again to proceed with the uninstall. Click *Cancel* to stop the uninstall.
- **4** The component uninstall is now complete. Click *Finish* to return to the available software page.
